## Refunding Bonds Save \$13,000

### STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION ACCEPTS REFUNDING BONDS STANTON IND. DISTRICT

Marks A Saving To the District Approximately \$13,000 Less Half Per Cent Interest

With all governments, national, state, county, and even down to the school district, aggressively fighting for an economic plan of operation, it remains for the Stanton Independent School District, either to take the lead or be among the leading parts or parcels of governments to acclaim that a plan has been agreed upon, that if acceptable to the Attorney General's department, will mean the saving of approximately \$13,000 to the Stanton Independent School District.

For the past ten months the board of trustees of the Stanton Independent School District, with their attorney, R. W. Hamilton, county attorney of Martin county, have been engrossed in the task of seeking support from the State Board of Education through the plan that the State purchase the \$40,000 outstanding bond issue held against the district by bond holders. Taking into account the demoralizing condition of the bond market, the trustees and their attorney, several months ago, began an effort to take advantage of the existing state of affairs with an eye single to a result that would be beneficial to the Stanton Independent School District. The plan was to interest the State Board to the point it would refund the 1923 bond issue of the Independent School District, which was \$40,000 bearing 5 1/2 per cent interest.

Under the laws of the State the State Board of Education is allowed to invest amounts out of the permanent school funds in school district bonds, bearing 5 per cent interest. After considerable negotiations with the bond holders and the State Board of Education, requiring a number of trips to Austin by Attorney Hamilton, and meeting with the State Board, a plan was affected at Austin, last Friday and Saturday, during the sessions of the State Board, whereby the State Board accepted the proposal to refund the \$40,000 bond issue of the Stanton Independent School District, including the principal and interest, and the bonds to bear only 5 per cent instead of 5 1/2 per cent, the rate that has and is at present, now being paid on the bonded indebtedness.

It must be borne in mind that after approval by the State Board of Education to take over any given amount of bonds, before the plan becomes iron clad, the refunding bonds must be approved by the Attorney General of the State. The representatives of the Stanton Independent School District feel confident that with the approval of the State Board, and the further fact these bonds have heretofore been tested and found gilt edged by bonding attorneys, the Attorney General will give the matter his sanction.

This school district is very fortunate to have succeeded in getting the proposition put over for the reason that the State Permanent Fund can only take care of about one-tenth of the applications are brought before it for refunding. At the meeting of the State Board of Education last Friday and Saturday, according to Attorney Hamilton, there were applications seeking refunds amounting to over two million dollars.

In the course of interesting the State Board of Education to accept the refund of the bond issue for the Stanton Independent School District, County Attorney R. W. Hamilton, made five trips to Austin in the interest of this matter, and with his plea before the State Board in session last Friday and Saturday, succeeded in getting the board's stamp of approval, which now goes to the Attorney General for his, the final decision.

The board of trustees of the Stanton Independent School District, are to be congratulated on their foresightedness in looking after the saving end for the school district. Saving a neat little of \$13,000 to the school district in times like these, shows tact and business judgment, that is deserving of highest commendation.

#### WOMEN OF COUNTY INVITED TO MEETING

There will be a meeting for all the women in Martin county, who are interested in poultry killing, dressing and canning in Stanton, May 13.

Home demonstration clubs are being organized and a County Home Demonstration Council will be formed from the members of these clubs, at this meeting. Any woman in this section who is interested in this work is invited to be present. At noon a covered dish luncheon will be served each woman bring a dish.

The place of meeting will be announced in next week's Reporter. All this work is without charge to the women participating.

### State Auditor Lynn Issues Biennial Report

The second biennial report, issued by More Lynn, state auditor and efficiency expert, reveals that the total amount of delinquent taxes due the State is \$119,645,325. Of this amount \$46,725,397 was for the last fiscal period, and \$72,919,928 for prior periods. There is some excuse for the delinquent tax amount last year, but amount due the state for "prior periods" shows that the manner of collecting taxes is sorely in need of remedying. That "prior periods" spell covers a period when the State was passing through prosperous times, a time when much of over that 72-millions of dollars could have been collected had the proper machinery been in motion. Doubtless, there were many taxpayers in those "prior periods" time could have easily settled for the taxes owed the county and State that were allowed to go by because of the faulty alignment of the machinery set up for collecting them.

The tax delinquency figures well demonstrates that the "faithful few" that pay their taxes, are not being squarely dealt with. They have been allowed to shoulder the burden of the expense of paying for the operation of the state and county governments, while other equally able to pay, are allowed to "ride" the state and county. That is one of the main reasons that the state's finances are in as bad condition as they are.

In the biennial report, figures furnished by City Clerk John Epley of the following items in the statement of Martin county covering tax collections, delinquent taxes, indebtedness and sinking funds for the last fiscal period ended prior to September 1, 1932, are published:

**Tax Collected:**  
General purposes, \$71,484.93; debt purposes, \$32,277.36; grand total, \$103,762.29.

**Delinquent Taxes:**  
Last fiscal period, \$46,236.04; prior to last fiscal period, \$17,212.06; grand total, \$63,448.10.

**Total Outstanding:**  
Current warrants, \$12,058.49; time warrants, \$5,750.00; bonded indebtedness, \$290,560; amount of sinking funds, \$11,091.07.

Relative to the Fresh Water district in Martin county, the report shows: taxes collected: general purposes, \$656.92; debt purposes, \$2,165.25; total, \$2,822.17. Delinquent taxes, last fiscal period, \$3,835.80; prior to last fiscal period, \$3,034.61; total, \$6,870.41. Total outstanding: bonded indebtedness, \$60,000; amount of sinking funds, \$6.13.

So far as the faculty doing its part, and the students theirs, as well as the school board, the term has proven a successful one. Salaries paid with a small amount of cash, has been the case with a majority of the schools this year, coupled with a decrease in salary.

Big Spring has selected its teachers for next year with no decrease in salaries, but shortened the term of school from nine months to six. If, at the end of the six months period it is found the school has sufficient funds to carry on the term longer, it will be done.

Midland has selected its teachers for another term with a reduction in salaries ranging from ten to fifteen per cent. The reduced salaries applies to the tax assessor for the school and the janitors. No mention was made of the term next year running less than nine months.

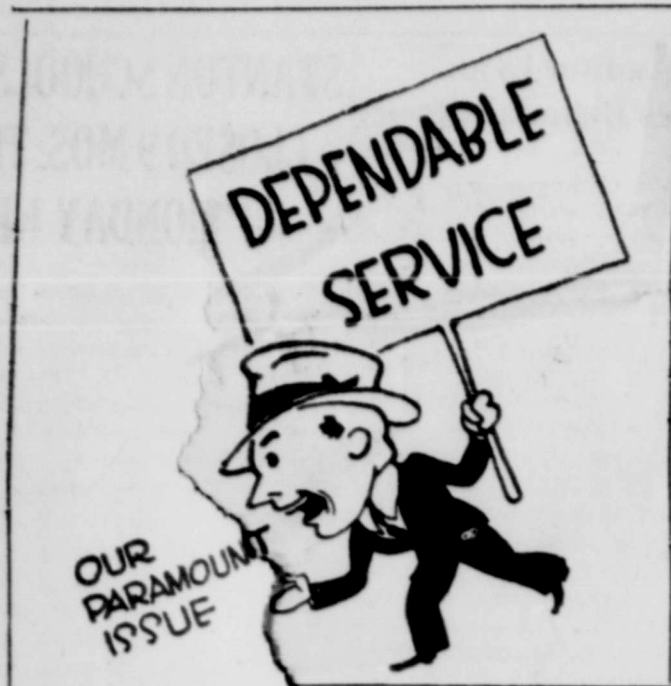

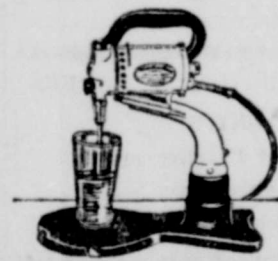

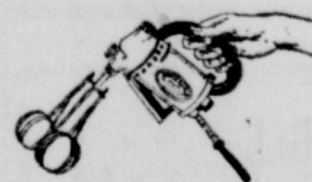
