NEW EDITOR OF TEXAS ALMANAC IS OFF THE PRESS

The Reporter has received a copy of the Texas Almanac and Industrial Guide, complimentary of the Dallas News.

There are more than a 1,000 articles, statistical tables, illustrations and maps, answering between 50,000 and 100,000 questions about Texas. Every phase of Texas' economic, political and civil development is covered, including farming and livestock, manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, population, railroads, aviation, highways and automobiles, motor transportation, inland waterways, minerals and mining, government and names of state, district and county officials, education, conservation and numerous other subjects.

A large folded sheet between the leaves of the volume carries political and railroad map on one side and highway map on the other. These maps were made especially for the Texas Almanac and are up to date and accurate. Morning, noon and night vie with each other it seems to see which can be the most alluring. Mankind is ever a welcome guest in the Davis Mountains—truly a wonderful region. Here it was that Dame Nature was crowned Queen of the Earth and here she has since ruled, holding court every day of the past year. She entertains lavishly and the hours spent under her reign are unforgettable. State To Vote On
\$20,000,000 Bonds

Gov. Ferguson has signed the resolution to submit the proposed \$20,000,000 bond relief issue to the voters of Texas, August 26.

The sanction came after advocates of the resolution had sought concurrence of the senate with house revisions on the proposal. The house had revised it to provide that real property would not be taxed to relieve the bonds.

The resolution provides for vote by the people on the bond issue August 26, at the same time they decide whether 3.2 per cent beer is to be made legal in Texas and whether the state is to ratify repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

The relief bond issue is proposed to match federal aid funds.


