ONE thing can be said in favor of the wets in Martin county and that is with the closing of the polls Saturday night the county had gone wet by equally as large margin (or strength) as 3.2. The rainfall over the county with Friday's precipitation, ranged from 3 inches to 4 inches. Some points in the county reported as much as 5 inches of rain falling.

Farmers and ranchmen have been busy locating drills with which to sow wheat, barley, cane, and whatnot, in the hope of realizing a winter pasturage for their stock. Many are planting fall gardens.

**THE ELECTION** is over. The votes cast have decided the question, whether it is to our individual liking. The thing to do now is for all to forget the election, band ourselves together for the purpose of freeing our country from the shackles of depression and drouth, and the want that is certain to be with us this winter. The recent rains have been greatly welcomed in Martin county, and will be of material benefit in more ways than one, yet the county is confronted with the proposition that its farmers will not realize a penny of revenue from crop yields. Long ago, the prospects for crops in this county went glimmering into the discard because of the protracted drouth. The populace must band itself together and make strenuous efforts to land projects that will give our people employment this winter. Let these projects be of a permanent and worthwhile nature.

**THE CONCLUSION** had about been reached that it couldn't rain in Martin county—that is—a rain of general proportions, but the heavy downpour of Saturday night, together with a good rain Friday night, knocked that conclusion into a cocked hat.

**THE THEORY** may be advanced that since Midland and Howard counties have gone wet by large majorities, they are in a position to squeeze all the "wet" desires out of Martin county, at it is tucked in snugly between the two counties.

**A SONG** that had been stilled for almost a year in Martin county came back Saturday night with a melodious air. It was the voice of the frogs. They sang with such vociferous voices as to almost deafen the ears of the Stanton citizen, but who was there that couldn't stand the deafening sensation when the ear drums were being played upon by tunes from the amphibian family while submerged in water that had fallen from the skies.

**AS LITTLE** as one might think there is some building activity going on in Stanton. The building to house the Gulf company as a filling station, one of the nicest plants in town, being built by Jim Tom and E. Price, is nearing completion, and a modern little station for the Magnolia company is being built at the intersection of the old and the new highway, at the west limits of the town. These two companies are in the NRA bandwagon, providing employment for several of the local laborers.

**THE papers** report an attempt to kidnap a rancher out in the open spaces of the great west. Assuming that our ideas of what life on the plains in the seventies was like are fairly correct, who can conceive of the kidnaping of a rancher of that period? Ranchers have not changed in spirit or in courage, but the times have. # RAIN GENERAL IN MARTIN COUNTY Remains

## MARTIN COUNTY VOTES DRY BY A GOOD MAJORITY

ONLY TWO BOXES OUT OF ELEVEN CAST A WET VOTE. BOND ISSUE CARRIES; STUBBEMAN CARRIES COUNTY.

The local option vote in the county stood 193 for to 292 against, with Precinct 1, Stanton, giving the largest vote against local option of any box in the count, with 54 for to 92 against.

The Earl Byrant box and Flower Grove voted for local option, the former going 6 for to 4 against and the latter 16 for to 9 against.

Precinct 2, Stanton, voted 71 for local option to 73 against.

The vote for the 3.2% beer amendment in the county went 212 for to 257 against.

The county voted against ratification by 282 against to 200 for.

The \$20,000,000 bonds carried in the county by a vote of 393 for to 84 against.

For representative of the 88th district the county gave Stubbeman of Midland 361 votes, to 80 votes for Bert Francis Howell of Rankin.

Texas, the 23rd state to approve repeal of prohibition, began Monday a period of waiting until the stroke of midnight, September 14, when the sale of beer will be permitted.

Final tabulation by the Texas Election Bureau gave the following vote on the issues in Saturday's election.

For repeal 279,567, against 165,082.  
For beer 282,735, against 155,419.  
For relief bonds 272,819, against 123,649.

The home rule amendment 259,189, against 190,611.  
For homestead amendment 322,693, against 63,285.

Complete returns show local sales of beer and repeal, poll majorities of more than 300 in Howard county.  
Midland county went for the sale of beer and repeal by a decisive majority.

Returns from local option elections has further magnified the position of Howard and Midland counties as decidedly "wet" spots.

Stirling was the only county bordering on Howard that voted to repeal the local option law and make sale of beer legal beginning with September 15.

3.2 per cent beer legal beginning with Martin county returned a majority for repeal but defeated the proposed to legalize beer locally.

Mitchell county rejected local sale of beer 762 to 410.  
Borden and Glasscock counties, both dry before national and state prohibition, did not hold elections on repeal of local option laws.

With three of the five boxes reported it appears Glasscock would return a majority of about ten against repeal. The count of five boxes against nine showed that Borden county would be 40 to 38 against repeal.

An unbroken line of locally dry counties was linked from Howard along the Texas and Pacific railway to Tarrant county, Fort Worth, Stephens county (Breckenridge) and Shackleford (Albany) to the north of the T & P on the north loop of the Bankhead highway were the only counties to the east that voted for local sale of beer.

The arid territory north of here was even more expansive. Potter county, of which Amarillo, is the county seat, was the nearest county to the plains that returned a majority for repeal of local option. Lubbock, Hale, Lamb,

## Hamilton Appointed District Attorney

Succeeds W. R. (Bob) Smith, Who Was Made Federal Attorney

There was W. R. (Bob) Smith, Jr., of Odessa, who came to that town a few years ago, a young lawyer, to hang out his shingle as an interpreter of Blackstone, settling in the community to keep folks out of jail who had intentions of breaking in. Soon he was appointed district attorney by Gov. Dan Moody, served out the appointive time, hopped in to be elected to the position and was for two terms.

Unfortunately, at that time Smith was a democrat and the republicans had a tight grasp on the reins of the national government, so there was nothing for Smith to do but stay with his job, despite his ambition to go higher up in governmental affairs. But it's a long lane that has no turn, and last November the Democrats administered unto the Republicans a good drubbing, and Franklin D. Roosevelt became President of the United States. Then followed the eventful moment in Smith's life—receiving the appointment of Federal Attorney for the Western District of Texas, over the strongest sort of opposition at San Antonio and other points in the district. Commission in hand Mr. Smith bundled up all his belongings at Odessa, last week, and with his estimable wife and beautiful daughter, rekked off to San Antonio, to take charge of a very important Federal office.

## BANKHEAD HIWAY COMPLETED THRU MARTIN COUNTY

TWENTY FOOT WIDE HIGHWAY IS OPEN TO TRAFFIC THROUGH MARTIN COUNTY. WORK NOW IN MIDLAND COUNTY.

The pouring of asphalt on the Broadway of America highway in Martin county has been completed and the road open to traffic to near the city of Midland.

A. E. Morgan, president of the Morgan Construction company, esti-

mates he could lay approximately one mile a day, but the state is not able to prepare the base fast enough, due to the difficulty in blasting rock from the Preston lease west of Stanton. This sandstone shows a percentage of wear (abrasion test for gravel) of 2.8 per cent, which is the hardest Morgan has ever tried to use. It is so difficult to break up that four jackhammers, instead of the usual two, are being used for dynamiting purposes and a fifth hammer has been received from Fort Stockton. A stratum of only seven feet is being taken, as water is encountered lower in such volume the pits could not be pumped dry.

A foment of activity surrounds operations in building the road, which is a result of public works project authority granted in house bill 54 of the 43rd legislature. A heavy steam shovel, the jackhammers, two rock crushers, blacksmith shop, many trucks and other equipment keeps up a din of noise during the working day.

Mr. Morgan explained that the first application of asphalt is spread three-tenths gallon to the square yard, the second four-tenths. Two asphalt trucks are kept busy pouring the hot top, which cannot be laid in temperature of 50 degrees or lower. The oil asphalt must be homogenous, free of water, shall not foam when heated to 175 degrees centigrade, and meet many other rigid requirements.

The minimum wage scale paid the workers on the basis of an 8-hour day, is \$2.80 for firemen; \$4 for distributor men; \$2.80 for truck drivers; \$4 for tractor men; \$4 for graders; \$2.80 for roller men; \$2.24 for spreaders and common laborers; \$1.60 for watchmen; \$1.20 for water boys; \$2.80 for broom men and \$4 for motor mechanics.

These prices are set by the state and are in the contract signed by Morgan. The Main Street of Stanton, (pity it couldn't have run clear to the court house or city hall), is constructed out of the same material as found on the highway, covers only one block, but it is worth the money.

Ford-in-it over this highway to Midland last Sunday afternoon, looked to this writer that the construction work on the highway would be completed into the city of Midland by Saturday night of this week.

There were handicaps that confronted the Morgan Construction company in building this highway, according to our way of thinking. Tearing up the old road bed began in dry weather, following it the grading and the laying of the caliche when it was dry as a bone, allowing the roadbed to settle with the caliche base, in the driest of weather when sandstorms were frolicking at their heights, and contended hot and dry weather, with traffic grinding out caliche into fine dust, and the winds blowing it out, leaving the road bed pockmarked with holes.

Then after several weeks of going through this stage without a drop of rain, contract awarded to finish the road with the Morgan Construction company receiving the award. Still dry hot weather with wind playing havoc with the road bed. Work was started on completion of the road. It meant thousands of water wagon loads of water to pour on the top to hold the caliche and make it mellow-like for the road graders to travel over and smooth down ahead of the asphalt spreaders. Up to this sort season rains have fallen, this is the worst of condition that confronted the Morgan Construction company since it started work on the Bankhead through Martin county, the starting point of construction activities on this highway.

## FIRST GENERAL RAIN IN MARTIN COUNTY SINCE YEAR

FALL IN STANTON AMOUNT TO 3.68 INCHES WHILE OTHER POINTS IN THE COUNTY REPORT 5 INCHES AND BETTER.

Rain, had about become an extinct number in Martin county, when Friday night along came a shower in Stanton that measured something like 1 1/2, and it covered a goodly portion of the county. But the climax to the rainfall came Saturday night when rain covered the county. This, added to the rainfall of Friday, amounted to 3.68 inches in Stanton, while other points in the county report all the way from 4 to 6 inches.

There were babies almost a year old in Martin county that had not witnessed a rain before. Some points in a year, for as far as known the only general rain over the county fell one year ago this month.

It had become so dry in this country that the folks began to keep their children in the house for fear they would step in a crack in the ground and they would be lost. The wings of the katydid became warped and he had to walk out of the county in search of a little moisture to straighten out his wings so he could once more fly. Even the voice of the locust that sings shrilly and melodiously on the hottest of day in the mesquite boughs, was hushed because of the dryness. Oh, boy, we tell you it was dry, in Martin county, but not more so than in other sections of this area.

Farmers, who had peeked out of their doors last fall, after harvesting a fairly good crop, predicting a far better condition this year, found they were not even able to plant a seed in the ground because of no moisture. Others took advantage of early planting and succeeded, through showers about as large as the top of an umbrella, to get some of the crops up and they shared in receiving a small amount of revenue from the "plow-up" campaign, while the majority of Martin county farmers received nothing from this source.


Martin county is supposed to gather 20,000 bales in normal times. If it produces 1,000 bales, we miss our guess.

But with what exaggerations might have been said here, the populace is aware that there will be no crops to speak of in Martin county this year. This county welcomes with outstretched arms the rains that have fallen within the week. We feel that a drouth of a serious proportion has been broken, and while it is realized there is tough sledding ahead for the people of this county this winter because of nothing to sell, we believe matters will adjust themselves to the condition and that all will work out to the community's advantage in the end.

The range lands that were getting very dry, have been greatly benefited by the rains. Ranchmen and farmers are planting pasturage crops and fall gardens.

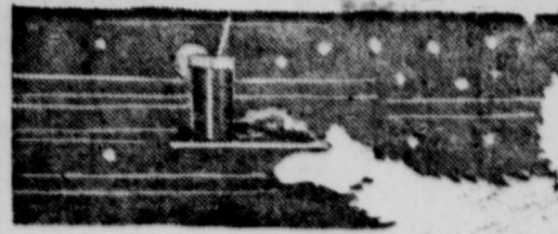

Mrs. Marguerite Peters Died Monday Night

Claimed To Be The First White Woman Settler in Martin County

Mrs. Marguerite Peters, 77, died Monday night at 9:00 o'clock, after an illness of only four days.

The funeral services were held Wednesday morning at 9:00 o'clock, at the St. Joseph Catholic church, with the Rev. Father Sherois, officiating, and burial in the Catholic cemetery.

Mrs. Peters was born April 14, 1856, in Alsace Lorraine, coming to the United States she settled in Iowa, where she married Nick Mundloch. Of this union four children were born, John,

Frank, and Joseph, and one girl who died an infant. The family moved to Pochontas, Arkansas, from Iowa, and on January 8th 1883, moved to Stanton, then known as Marienfeld.

In November 1888, Nick Mundloch died and was buried in the Catholic cemetery at Marienfeld, now Stanton.

In the spring of 1885 Mrs. Mundloch married J. J. Peters, and to this union were born seven children, William, John, Clement, Ignatius, Paul, Joseph and Annie, all of whom survive her.

Mrs. Peters was the second oldest settler in Stanton, claiming to be the oldest white woman settler.

The husband, J. J. Peters, died February 27, 1917, and she remained a widow to the time of her death.

Frank Stubbeman Wins As Legislator

Midland Lawyer Wins From Rankin Man in 88th District Race

Frank Stubbeman, 27 year old lawyer from Midland was leading his opponent, B. F. Howell, Rankin lawyer by 700 votes out of the 4,200 votes tabulated and not enough votes were believed to be out to change the results in this special election to choose a representative for the 88th legislative district. This is Texas' largest legislative district, consists of 13 counties, borders on New Mexico and the Rio Grande. Mr. Stubbeman will take the place of the late Frank Haag, who lost his life in an automobile accident near San Angelo a short time ago.

Mr. Stubbeman will qualify for the office in time for the special session of the legislature which it is believed will be held about September 11.

Mr. Stubbeman has been in Midland three and one-half years, coming from Cuero to his new home. He was recently married.

Mr. Howell captured four of the thirteen counties: Upton, Crane, Reeves and Pecos.

Beer Start Flowing Midnight Sept 14th

County Judges may Start Sept. 6th To Hear Applications for Permits

Austin—Legal beer will start flowing in Texas on the stroke of midnight Sept. 14, under terms of an act passed by the Legislature in anticipation of adoption of a constitutional amendment to permit its manufacture and sale.

Texas' formal vote on ratification of repeal will be cast when the wet delegates gather in Austin Nov. 24. The vote will be simply a matter of routine.

County Judges may start Sept. 6 to hear applications for permits to distribute and sell beer. Filing of applications may start Sept. 1, but can be heard only after five days public notice, to be given by posting the application on the courthouse door.

No Further Legislation Needed No further legislation will be necessary to open the beer valves in Texas, although several corrections likely will be made in the law when the Legislature meets in special session this month.

Beer sold in Texas will be taxed at the rate of \$1.50 per barrel, the tax to be paid by the person making the first sale. Three million stamps now are in process of printing, the contract having been awarded conditioned on the outcome of the election. Treasury officials estimated the State would receive \$325,000 in revenue during the first sixty days after legal sales start.

Permits to dispense the brew must be obtained from the County Tax Collector after the application has been approved by the County Judge.

Multitudinous safeguards have been thrown around the sale of beer. Violation of almost any of the provisions subjects the offender to revocation of his license.

In addition to the State tax heavy license fees were levied on the industry. Cities and counties each have the privilege of levying one-half the State license tax, but may not invade the field of direct beer taxation.

It was anticipated that County Judges in territories that voted to legalize beer sales would be deluged immediately with applications for licenses to sell beer.

Barring physical disabilities, Dave Foreman, plans to enroll at A. C. C., Sept. 12. Miss Addie Turner has expressed the same intention.

N. R. A. Pledges Continue to Pour in

Spokesman Confident As Ever In Forecasting Remarkable Results

As the NRA campaign entered the middle of the third week, enthusiasm was undiminished, pledges continued to pour in. While troubles have put in their appearance and the campaign is obviously touching its most crucial point, spokesmen are as confident as ever in forecasting remarkable results.

The NRA blanket code has usurped the place of the trade codes in the news. The latter, however, will probably be in operation longer than the NRA, and the law, instead of public opinion only, is back of them. It is an open secret that the government is dissatisfied with trade code progress and is making every effort to speed matters up. One of the most important, lumber, was thrown out when first sent in. Now the President has signed and approved lumber code which is expected to do much for the industry and its employees.

Minimum wages ranges from 23 cents an hour in the South to 40 cents in the North and West, with a 40-hour week which may be extended to 48 hours at seasonal peak. An agency known as the Lumber Code Authority, Inc., is given the job of protecting price levels and controlling production. Every operating company will be given an allotment, and production quotas for various divisions of the industry will be arranged on the basis of consumption, including anticipated export demand. Selling price is never to be allowed to drop below the cost of production point. Underselling will be illegal. The agreement is designed to increase lumber and timber employment by 115,000 men.

"Chislers" Appearing The first NRA "chislers" are appearing. These firms which sign the agreement, then violate it by bringing wages to the specified minimum, keeping workers on the job for longer hours than are allowable, etc. Cases have been found where employees have protested, only to be told that if they reported violations to NRA directors, they would be discharged. General Johnson and subordinates are going after concerns in this classification. The law may step in. Signed NRA pledges are sent through the mails. Postmaster General Farley is considering the possibility of prosecuting employers who sign and then violate, under the postal fraud statute.

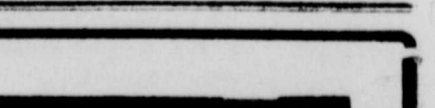
General Johnson has inaugurated a Buy Now campaign, with the buying restricted to NRA members. An executive order, permitting cancellation of government contracts with manufacturers who have not come into the fold, has been issued. No new government contracts will go to non-NRA firms.

Baylor (Seymour) Archer, Cottle, and Wichita, were the only locally wet counties to the northeast except one precinct "Old Glory" in Stonewall county, which decided to bring beer back.

After skipping Martin immediately

west the counties to and including El Paso, either repealed local option Saturday or were not locally dry before national prohibition and therefore may sell beer after September 15 by reason of the state's majority for the beer amendment.

Tom Green, Edwards and Upton counties were in the group favoring local sale of beer.

Other counties which repealed local option insofar as 3.2 beer is concerned includes: Hartley, Lipscomb, Wilbarger, Wheeler, Moore, Hemphill, Orange, Travis, Nueces, McLellan, Gray Collin, Sutton, the town of San Benito, Uvalde, Dallas, Tarrant, Gray.

Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, and Parker were all reported dry.

Counties in which the proposal to sell beer was turned down included: Carson, Hardeeman, Ford, Knox, Collingsworth, Childress, Bailey, Jack, Clay, Young, Hall, Roberts, Hansford, Castro, Donley, Throckmorton, Haskell, Crosby, Dickens, Hockley, Erath, Coleman.

According to the latest report there are 130 counties that will have beer and 124 that will be "bone dry."

To the west of Stanton Midland, Ector, Winkler, Crane, Ward Reeves, and Pecos, also Jeff Davis, are in the wet column. So the Martin county citizen going to El Paso, will travel in wet territory all the way. Going east to Fort Worth, outside of Howard the traveler will go through dry territory, unless he elects to go north of

Abilene then the first county struck that will be wet will be Shackelford followed by Stephens count.

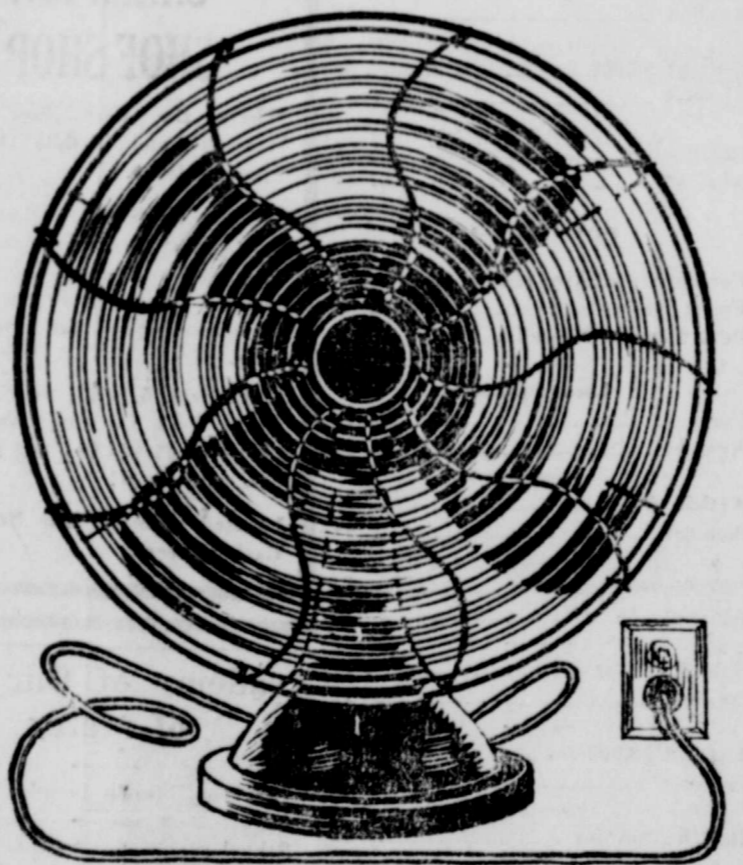
