## BUFFALO BELLOWS R. F. C. HEADQUARTERS VERY BUSY PLACE

LLOYD BREWER, EDITOR  
GLEANINGS FROM OCTOBER OUTLOOK  
(Official Spokesman for the Texas State Teachers Association)

"The enemies of the free public school educational system of this country must be hunted out, advertised, met in their work and put to route.

"At the beginning of the Protestant era, the great thinkers of that day enunciated three great principles:

"First. The individual responsibility of man to God.

"Second. The right of man to participate by voting in the government that controlled him—Democracy.

"Third. That if man should participate in the government that controlled him, it was the civic duty of the state to educate him free in order to make it possible for an intelligent participation.

"Thus was the free public school system born and it took over three hundred years to transform educational practices. In a government by those governed, it is essential that the citizen, to cast an intelligent vote and to participate in the policies and working of his parliamentary government, be educated at public cost. Therefore, the Constitution of the United States and the free public schools will live or die together.

"The PUBLIC SCHOOL is as much a part of our government of Democracy as the Constitution and to seek, either publicly or privately, to destroy either of them is nothing less than treason to the United States.

"We American people have long ago decided that the child, to be a good citizen, must be educated, and that if the state uses him or her for its development and operation, it must educate them free so as to insure an intelligent participation of all men and women in this government of freedom and equality. We shall not forfeit our victory of yesterday. Autocracy shall not devour Democracy, the hope of World civilization."—Marion S. Church.

"We have been passing through the first serious mass attack on the American educational system. In the past, as has been frequently remarked, education has been the American substitute for a national religion. But almost at once when this depression started the onslaught on education began. Of course, salaries were reduced, school terms were shortened, school building postponed. These things are comprehensible, if not intelligent. What is less easy to understand in the readiness of our people to withhold salaries when earned, to regard demands for them as extortion, and to deliver themselves of extended orations on frills in education. I have never been able to discover what a frill is. Apparently it is something that is good for the child, and good for society, but which the school was not able to do fifty years ago. On this theory Mr. Roosevelt's recovery program might be called a frill in government. Certainly the responsibilities now laid upon the schools are such that an attempt to meet them with the three R's would be as futile as trying to deal with the economic situation with the slogans of Harding and Coolidge.

About the busiest place visited by a Reporter representative this week was the headquarters of the R. F. C., which is under the supervision of Ray Simpson. The plan of work was greatly assisted this week by the visit of R. D. Crum, field representative with the Rehabilitation Relief Committee in Texas. He thoroughly approved of the work being done in Martin county and his suggestions were merely for a wider scope of work, shortening the hours and putting more men to work on the highway and city streets, feeding of the undernourished children both of pre-school and school age.

Questions have been asked as to paid workers for making up materials furnished by the Red Cross, this comes under the head of a workers' project and has been sent in for approval. When approved the work will be given ONLY to those whose names appear on the R. F. C. Relief Roll in Martin county.

The R. F. C. has cans and are authorized to give them out to persons who have garden truck which they wish to can and they in turn pay toll to the Community kitchen and these cans of vegetables will be given out to the ones who have nothing to can. It has been the custom here to give half to the person furnishing the cans and the R. F. C. only asks a return of a smaller per cent. This is to, as far as possible, make the kitchen self-supporting.

It might be well if every citizen would keep in mind the fact that the funds which are disbursed by the R. F. C. are borrowed monies and there will be a pay day, so it behooves the committee to be careful in the expenditure. Only projects which have been asked for by City Councils, School Boards, Coun-

ty Commissioners, for the improvement of streets, roads, or public properties and these in turn approved by the State Department can have the use of the funds. And then the funds can be expended FOR LABOR ONLY. There are a large number already on the relief rolls of Martin county and it is the wish of Mr. Simpson that every worthy family in the county who is unable to make the grade this winter apply for aid at R. F. C. headquarters, and we are sure that when they understand that the money is only loaned to us to help through these trying times and we will all have to help in paying it back that those will apply who really are deserving. Mr. Simpson assured the reporter that there would be food, clothes and fuel in plenty for every needy family and that if they went without it would be their own fault. Just at present the most urgent thing is the distribution of the meat—2500 pounds—of which has been received by the committee and will be found at the Purser building, south of W. A. Kaderli's office. This meat is to be given those who sign the proper blanks for same. Each day finds a string of people with foolish questions who file through the office of the R. F. C. They didn't tell us that but we know they do, for we were just full of foolish questions of our own—this is just a hint too—if you can't do something to help, don't hinder. We found the management of the R. F. C. being carried on in a business like way with reports going in regularly to headquarters, being approved through the proper channels. We predict that before this thing is over Ray Simpson's black hair will be a silvery grey.

"No one who has watched the political steam roller in Chicago crushing the school system of that city doubts that the current attack upon free public education is concerted and methodical. No one who has followed a widely-read editor's contention that

parents should pay privately for the high school education of their children can doubt but that the attack is made upon the principle of democratic equality of opportunity, not No one who is observing the attempts of the Omaha Federal Land Bank to upon extravagant school management, reduce support for western rural schools has any doubt about the source of the opposition to free schooling. "The issue is clear cut. The enemies of tax-supported education believe the depression offers the opportunity to destroy the public schools. They are at work. "There is only one force upon which the friends of public education can depend—the force of public opinion. There is no time for Achilles to stay in his tent."—West Virginia School Journal.

### TWO MILLION DOLLARS ALLOTTED DROUGHT AREA

Allotment of \$2,670,000 by the Public Works Administration to relieve unemployment and suffering resulting from drought in parts of Texas was announced from Washington Wednesday.

Counties in which emergency relief will be extended in the form of highway construction include Borden, Midland, Martin, Andrews, Ector and Howard, said an Associated Press dispatch from Washington.

Of the \$2,670,000 allotment approximately \$900,000 will be used for drought relief highway construction and the remainder will be placed at the disposal of the highway department by the federal administration.

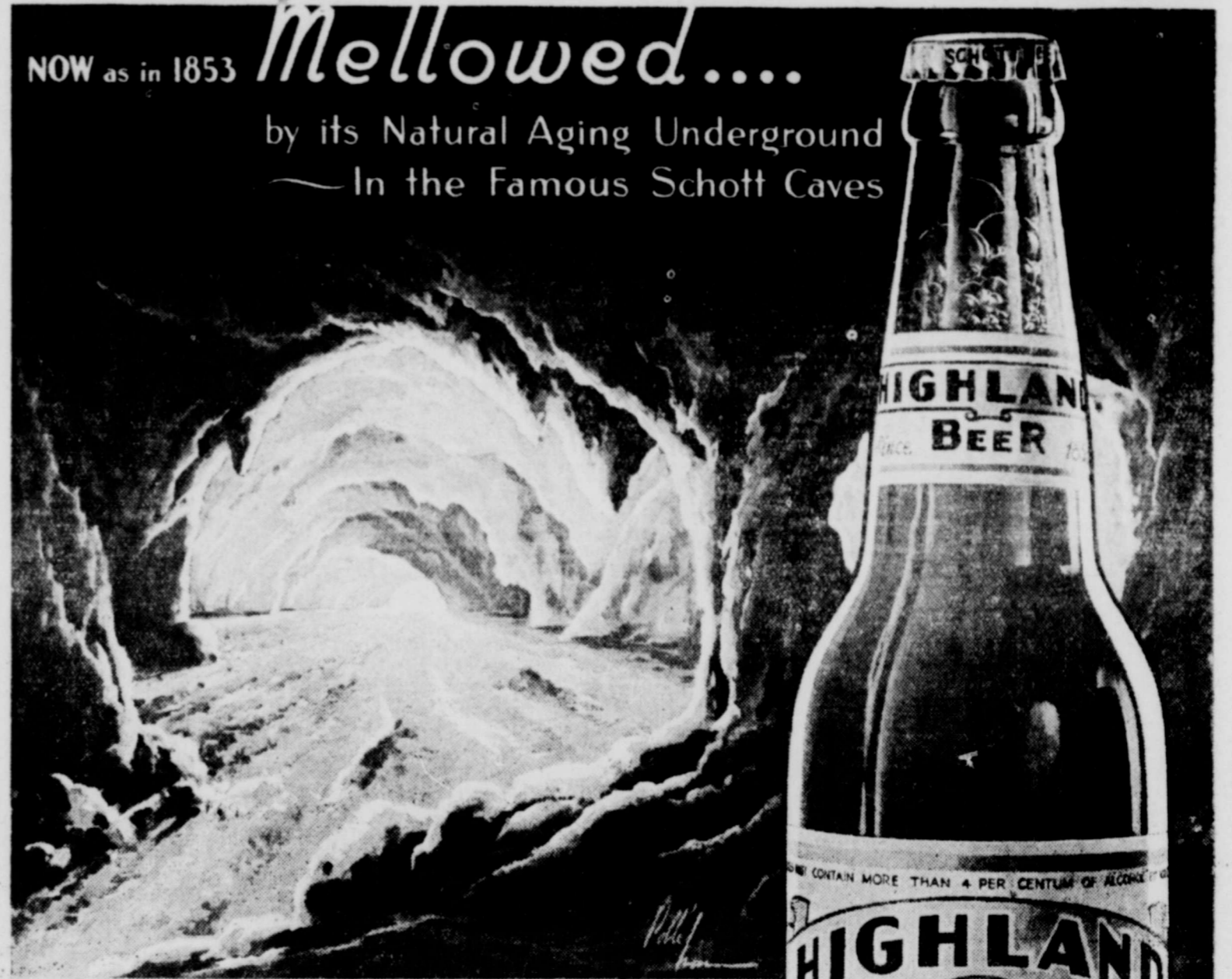

**BOLT LIGHTNING BRINGS INSTANT DEATH R. G. MAN**

Lee Hamlin, 64, pioneer Howard county farmer, was killed instantly by a bolt of lightning at 5:25 p. m. Tuesday as he stepped from a car to direct a visitor back to town. He was killed near his home thirteen miles north of Big Spring. Hamlin had been sitting in the automobile with J. H. Kirkpatrick before he stepped from the car and walked to the front of the car to point

out the best route back to the city. "There was a flash and a clap," Kirkpatrick said, "and when I could see again he was lying on the ground in front of the car." Force of the bolt shredded Mr. Hamlin's hat into scores of pieces. His body was badly burned by the electrical discharge. Mr. Kirkpatrick was unhurt. The bolt came from a small thunder head. R. D. Hamlin of Midland is a brother of the deceased.

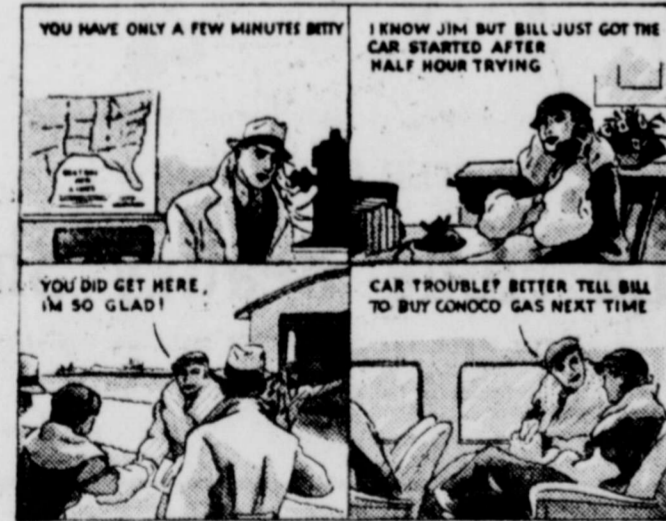

### OUR SCHOOLS DEMAND SERIOUS THOUGHT

As some millions of school children all over the United States are getting themselves squared away for the coming year, their fathers and mothers might profitably spend a little time in meditation about the present plight of the entire school system.

Few public services have felt the depression more than the schools. The teachers have gone unpaid, school activities have been cut down, some schools have been forced to extend their holiday periods, others have had to close entirely, nearly all have had to drop certain courses and consolidate a number of activities.

Nor is that the worst. While all of this has been happening, there has

been developing an influential and vocal group which has insisted that the schools have been getting more than their share of tax revenues even in good times. We are being told that our school system is far more elaborate and more expensive than it need be. It is being argued not only that the school budget must be drastically reduced during the depression, but that the reductions must be permanent.

Anyone who has ever paid taxes will admit that the schools have been costly. It is probably true that many school executives have become a bit self-important in their claims for tax support. Some towns have built school buildings on a too elaborate scale. Some schools have tried to include too many things in their curricula.

Nevertheless, admitting that there has been extravagance and lack of judgment in many school boards, one far more important fact remains unchanged. It is simply this: Our

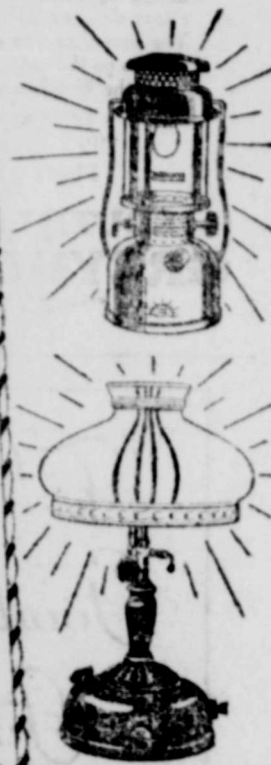
