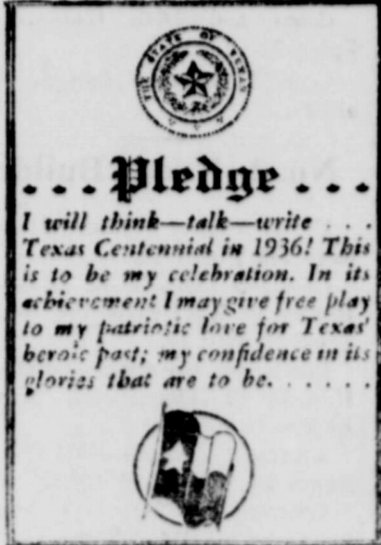

TOMMY LEE DIES INJURY IN AUTO ACCIDENT

The people of Stanton were dazed Monday morning when they received a message that Tommy Lee, proprietor of the Little Cafe in Stanton, had succumbed to an injury received Sunday night in an automobile mishap on the road between Odessa and Andrews.

From best information obtained Mr. Lee, two young men and a young lady left Odessa in the night of Sunday for their homes at Andrews. Mr. Lee had recently opened a cafe in Andrews, a subsidiary of the cafe he owned in Stanton. He had left the operation of the Stanton cafe to his brother Jesse Lee.

From sources nearly accurate as possible Mr. Lee, accompanied by two young men and a young lady left Odessa, after attending the rodeo, after night for their homes in Andrews. Nearing the town of Andrews they encountered a truck headed for Odessa. In passing, as the report goes, supposedly he had his arm protruding out of the car window at the driver's seat, when meeting a truck headed into Odessa. As the two met it is conjectured that the truck and the Lee car "closed in" to the point that the truck jammed the arm of Lee in such a way and mangled it that after carrying him back to Odessa to a hospital it was decided to amputate the arm, from which shock and loss of blood, he died at 3:05 Monday afternoon.

Tommy Lee came to Martin county in 1909, schooled in this county, and has been a resident of the county off and on since.

Meager reports of the accident are summed up in that Lee, two young men and a young lady of Andrews were in the Lee car and they escaped with slight injuries.

From best that could be learned Lee was driving his car with elbow protruding and passing the truck his arm was crushed, necessitating amputation. A passerby picked up Lee and took him to the Hedley Hospital at Odessa Sunday night.

Monday night the remains were brought to Stanton where they lay in state at the Stanton Hotel until Tuesday night and sent to Dallas for burial at the side of Mr. Lee's parents.

Between 3,000,000 and 5,000,000 sheep and goats are expected to be purchased.

MAHON OPENED HIS CAMPAIGN AT LITTLEFIELD

SPOKE TO ONE OF THE LARGEST POLITICAL CROWDS OF THE YEAR AND ACCORDED WARM RECEPTION.

(Special to Reporter)
Littlefield, August 9.—George Mahon, leading candidate for Congress in the first primary, opened his run-off campaign in Littlefield, last Saturday. He spoke to one of the largest political crowds of the year, and was accorded a warm reception by the citizenship of Lamb county.
Mr. Mahon discussed his platform fully, making clear his stand upon the issues of the campaign. He pointed out that the problems of agriculture were of primary importance in the new 19th district. He indicated that he favored a farm program for the farmer, including tariff adjustments designed to expand our foreign trade and provide markets for our products. In explaining his stand on the bonus question, he said: "I favor immediate payment of the Soldier's Bonus, and the passage of a universal draft act mobilizing both industry and men and taking the profit out of war."
He stressed forcefully the fact that he was asking to represent all the people of the entire district. He stated that he intended to carry on an aggressive campaign from now until the 25th of August, carrying his message to the people in the same manner that he used through the first primary. He expressed gratefulness for the endorsement which was given him at the polls on July 25th when he received 19,524 votes while his nearest opponent received 10,881.

E. PETREE RESIGNS AS MEMBER OF SCHOOL BOARD

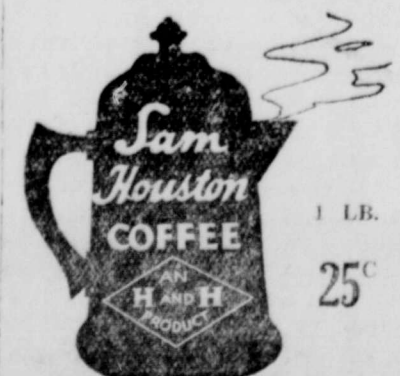

All Cotton Contracts Approved By Board

(S. A. Debnam, County Agent)
Reporting that contracts from every cotton county in Texas have been approved and certified to Washington, the State Cotton Board of Review presented this week the final figures in the cotton acreage reduction campaign. A summary of the certificates of the 223 cotton counties shows a grand total of 236,183 contracts affecting 4,282,723 bales of 478 pounds net weight; 14,126,746 adjusted base acres, and 5,322,368 rented acres. The contracts show that 37.7% of the base acres were rented to the Government. The total rental payments amount to \$26,777,280 and the parity payment of one cent per pound will amount to \$8,153,513. In most cases the checks for the first rental payment have been received by the farmers. The second rental payment will be made in early fall after the

land has been measured and the compliance certificates sent to Washington. The parity payments will be made in December.

In connection with these final figures it is of interest to note that Texas has about one-fourth of the cotton counties and one-fourth of the contracts in the United States, representing nearly one-third of the lint, and over one-third of the cotton acreage.

County by county figures released this week for the first time by the Corn-Hog Board indicate that 32,104 Texas farmers in 228 counties have contracted to participate in the corn-hog reduction program. As cash return for their cooperation \$4,805,500 will be coming to these farmers.

The Board has now made contract allotments in all but seven counties. Already county committees in 103 counties have made their adjustments within allotments. Martin county being one of the 103. The movement of county contracts to Washington will proceed rapidly now. Mr. Holmgren, chairman of the board states, and returning checks will be coming right along as the contracts receive final approval and are passed for payment.

All farmers in Martin county having Corn-Hog contracts are asked to call at the office of the county agent, third floor of the court house, to sign the contracts, since they have been typed. The sooner these are signed, the sooner they can be mailed to College Station to be forwarded to Washington.

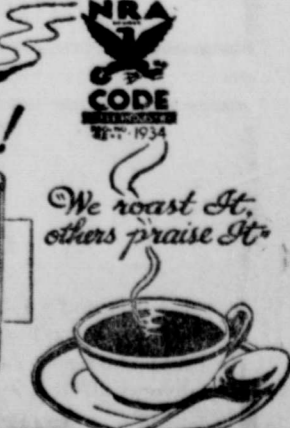
