

> rotation system so that a part of the ranch is rested each year, all of it over a period of a few years. On severely depleted ranges, grasses may be so low in vigor that it often takes several years of rest to get the range back in good condition. A good way to restore depleted ranges is to practice deferred grazing during the summer, graze lightly during the winter, and be careful to leave a protective cover on the ground at all times. You may have to rest your pastures during the growing season for several years to get them back in good condition, but then a 3 to 6 months deferment every three vears will usually be adequate. Last year, cooperators in the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District deferred 188,650 acres of rangeland during the growing season. What are you going to do this year?


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


