Bass grow fast only during summer and early fall-a 5 or 6 month season of abundant food. The major food is newly hatched fingerling bluegills in a basstherefore, must fertilize his fishpond all summer long to grow the most pounds and the biggest

Fertile water grows green microscopic algae which feeds a heavy poundage of worms. The worms grow more bluegills. The bluegills would grow in summer too if they did not spawn. They do spawn, however, and the tens of thousands of little bluegills eat so much food that their parents cannot grow during the June-October period. Bluegills grow larger at another season

of the year-February to June. Some pondowners stop their fertilization program to keep the bluegills from spawning so much. This is a bad mistake. Bass cannot grow unless they are well fed. A heavier poundage of bass will help prevent an overpopulation of bluegills—by eating more during the following fall, winter and spring. This important "thinning" of the bluegill population begins in October, following their spawning season. It ends in early summer when the bluegills spawn again. Failure to maintain pond fertility throughout the spring, summer, and fall results in low production of bass.

The best ponds-the best fishing-require good summer fertility. Next year's bass crop depends on it.

So, select as strong a wire for that purpose as you can find - and one that is as rust-resistant as possible.

If you want to get fancy with your home-made anchors here's something else you can do. Punch two holes in the side of the bucket, directly across from each other and some two inches from the bottom. Through these holes insert a piece of iron rod, such as is used to reinforce concrete. Let this rod extend out from the sides of the can about three or four inches.
