

## Old Settlers Reunion Draws 2,000

### Annual Affair Declared As One Of The Best In History

Martin Countians witnessed a perfect blend of what a good old-fashioned Old Settlers Reunion celebration ought to be on the silver anniversary of the annual event here Monday and Tuesday.

A lengthy parade, blaring band, prancing horses, pretty girls, colorful floats, old fiddlers' contest, genuine western style barbecue, bearded men and women dressed in attire of yesteryear all served to make the perfect pattern for the gala affair.

Finally, and in a spirit of sympathetic feeling for those old timers who have answered the last roll call an appropriate memorial ceremony was conducted Tuesday evening by George B. Shelburne.

George Cockrell of Canadian won first place in the Old Fiddlers' contest which was a special feature of the Monday night gathering. Second place went to Tom Castle of Knott.

Other entries in the Old Fiddlers' contest were D. B. Longley of Andrews, Perry Geurin of Stanton, Jess Sanders of Big Spring, Herbert Shipp of Stanton, T. J. Kyle of Big Spring, Bill Thomason of Big Spring, Arthur Ashley of Midland, Claude Gilliland of Big Spring, and N. J. Bell of Midland.

Dan Saunders served as master of ceremonies at the Monday night meeting. Following the fiddlers' contest films of past reunions were shown by T. W. Wayne and visiting concluded the night's program.

Tuesday morning and much of the afternoon, oldtimers reminisced of other days at reunion headquarters, the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Company. Displayed in many of the windows of Stanton business houses were pictures and reminders of days gone by.

Highlight of the two-day celebration was the parade Tuesday afternoon.

### Jake Hamon No. 1 Flowing Gas From Strawn

Jake L. Hamon No. 1 Roseco Holton Estate, West Martin County wildcat, was swabbing new and load oil and flowing gas from the Strawn zone of the Pennsylvanian on last report.

In 11½ hours, the project swabbed 43 barrels of load oil, 28 barrels of acid water and 34 barrels of new oil. Then in 26 hours, it returned 27.35 barrels of new oil, and two barrels of acid water. During the swabbing, a steady stream of gas flowed from the formation.

The gas and fluid is being recovered from perforations at 10,804-10,840 feet.

Location is 21 miles northwest of Stanton, 7,577 feet from east and 5,872 feet from south lines of league 246, Wheeler County School Land survey.

Pan American Petroleum Corporation No. 8 Breedlove is a new well in the Breedlove (Devonian) area in Northwest Martin County.

On 24-hour potential test, it flowed 407 barrels of oil, through a 12/64-inch choke, and perforation from 12,014 to 12,024 feet, after a 500-gallons acid treatment. Gas-oil was 19-1.

The new oiler is 1,073 feet from south and 25 feet from west lines of labor 112, league 258, Briscoe County School Land survey, seven miles southwest of Patricia.

### Martin Farm Hands Get Average Wages

The wage survey conducted in Martin County two weeks ago revealed that workers were paid from 50 to 60 cents an hour for hoeing cotton and grain sorghums. This information was sent to the Texas Employment Commission by Ed McDonald, regional director of the Employment Security Office at Dallas.

In making the survey, Clyde Roe found the average crew ranged from three to seven persons. The wages were about equally divided between 50 and 60 cents an hour.

The demand for farm workers in this area is fairly light, according to Jack Hatch, farm labor representative of the TEC.

The cotton chopping is almost finished in many communities. However, there are a few ranch jobs which offer up to \$75 per month. Not many applicants want ranch jobs, though, and very few of them will consider farm work.

The farm labor picture is spotty over the state. Lubbock is advertising for 400 workers to pick cucumbers on the halves. In the Lower Valley cotton picking will begin about July 10, where hundreds of workers are needed. Farmers will pay \$2.05 per hundred for cotton picking, while weighing and hauling is priced at 50 cents a hundred.

Dan Saunders, county tax assessor, has asked every taxpayer who has not already rendered his property, personal or real, to come into the tax office and render it.

The Martin County Board of Equalization will meet on Monday, July 14 at the commissioners courtroom to set valuation of county property. No raise is expected, Saunders said.

Anyone who has bought or sold property since January 1 is asked to be sure to contact the tax office because office employees will begin making up the tax roll on August 1, Saunders said.

Outside of this, about all they'll need is a comfortable place for the reporters to stay, and the trouble spot will be in business.

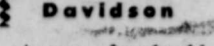
The way I see it, one trouble spot's as good as another, and it's sheer waste and a tax on a man's mind to shift it around every few months.

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### THIS WEEK —In Washington With Clinton Davidson ARE WE LOSING THE COLD WAR?



Davidson

A man who should know—Sen. Stuart Symington—solely warns the Nation that we are in grave danger of losing the cold war to the Communist Bloc nations.

Such a warning coming from an acknowledged authority on national defense carries tremendous weight. It should shock and alert every American. It shocked the Senate into almost a billion dollar increase in the defense budget.

Sen. Symington of Missouri probably knows as much about national defense as any man in Washington. Before being elected to the Senate he was Assistant Secretary of War for Air, and Secretary of the Air Force. He is a member of the Armed Services Committee and the Senate Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee.

When it became known that he planned to address the Senate on national defense, other Senators came to listen and the galleries were packed. His warning, however, needs more emphasis than press reports gave it.

**Our Survival Threatened**  
"If," he said, "we continue to drift as we are drifting, the question of our survival as a great Nation will become as important to us tomorrow as it is to the people of France today."

"We still have the right to choose the way, but if we continue to drift and dream, that choice will not be ours for long."

The greatest threat to our survival in the conflict with communism, Sen. Symington declared, is the smug complacency with which we take for granted that we can

win all wars because we never lost one.

"We already have suffered a series of diplomatic defeats, he said. American prestige is at a low ebb all over the world. Russia is not unaware that we are experiencing serious economic difficulties."

"Russian military superiority is more than idle boast, Russia alone has 175 divisions that are combat-ready. We are in the process of reducing our Army to 14 divisions, at least 4 of which are largely equipped with World War II weapons," Symington said.

**Soviets Are Gaining**  
"Russia is at least 2 or 3 years ahead of us in missile development, and gaining. She has put into orbit a 3,000-lb. missile, more than 100 times as large as anything we can send up."

"The United States cannot airlift and properly support overseas a single division. We would have to depend upon some miracle to transport troops where needed."

"We knew as far back as two years ago that Russia had a modern fleet of some 500 submarines, more than 10 times the number Hitler had. Russia has the capacity to launch missiles from nuclear-powered submarines."

"The facts show clearly and incontrovertibly that the military strength of the Communists is growing faster than our own. The survival of the United States depends that we embark immediately upon an all-out, top-priority research and development effort in the field of new weapons."

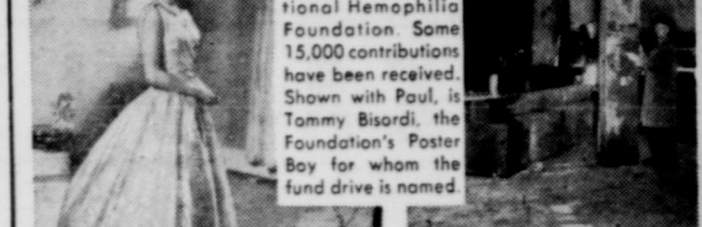

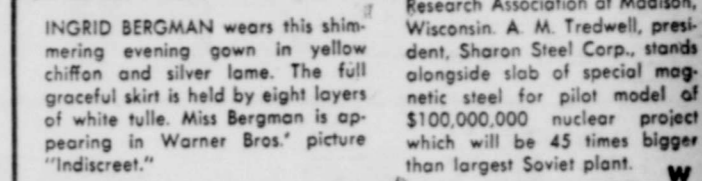

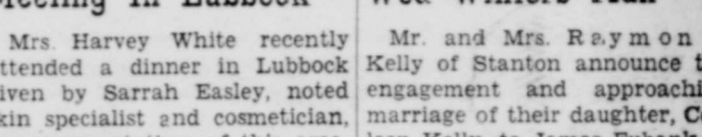

"Section 2. It is hereby further found and determined that the rehabilitation, conservation, or slum clearance and redevelopment, or a combination thereof, of such slum or blighted area or areas, is necessary in the interest of public health, safety, morals or welfare of the residents of the City.

"Section 3. It is hereby further determined that the City of Stanton shall exercise the powers granted to the City by the Urban Renewal Law of the State of Texas, except the Urban Renewal Project Powers as defined in said Urban Renewal Law.

"Section 4. It is hereby further determined to be necessary and in the public interest that the City of Stanton elect, and, accordingly, the City hereby elects to have said Urban Renewal Project Powers exercised by the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Stanton, which Agency is created by said Urban Renewal Law.

"Section 5. The findings, determinations, and elections herein made are made in accordance with and the various terms used herein are used in the same sense as used or defined in said Urban Renewal Law."
