**Amerada Plans To Drill Test In SE Howard**

Amerada Petroleum Corporation announced location for a 10,500-foot wildcat in Southwest Howard County eight miles east of Stanton.

Sited for tests of the Devonian, it is No. 1 Blanch Lester, 2,447 feet from south and 2,173 feet from west lines of section 41, block 33, T-1-S, T&P survey. Operations are to start at once.

Jake L. Hamon and Republic Natural Gas Company No. 1 Roscoe Holton Estate, West Martin County wildcat, has been shut in for additional storage. Tanks on the lease have been filled with oil produced during an extended test period. The last gauge reported from the project was 17 barrels of oil in 24 hours, through a 20/64-inch choke.

The zone tested was Strawn, through perforations in casing from 10,804 to 10,840 feet.

Site is 7,777 feet from east and 5,873 feet from south lines of league 246, Wheeler County School Land survey, 21 miles west and slightly north of Stanton.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 M. McKaskle, scheduled 11,100-foot wildcat in Southeast Martin County, 11 miles north and slightly east of Stanton, was making hole below 2,012 feet in lime and shale on last report.

Drill site is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 12, block 35, T-1-N, T&P survey.

**New Telephone Books Mailed To Stanton Patrons**

The new Stanton directories were mailed to subscribers here July 29, 1958, Cliff Fisher, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company manager announced today.

"The new directory contains approximately 800 alphabetical listings," Fisher said.

Old directories should be thrown away as soon as the new issue is received. However, care should be taken to remove any items such as photos, letters, and notes which might have been placed between the pages, the manager advised.

The Stanton directory has a green cover and contains 12 "white" or alphabetical pages and 20 "yellow" or classified pages. Approximately 1,600 copies of the directory has been printed.

**Springer Reports Good Rain Sunday In Lenorah Area**

Following soon on the heels of being presented an award by the chief officials of the Department of Commerce and Chief of the Weather Bureau, Washington, D. C., for his efficient service as Weather Observer at Lenorah, Grover Springer, chalked up another mark of efficiency Monday morning.

He phoned The Reporter office that a rain had fallen at Lenorah Sunday evening that measured 1.06 inches, the only rain of any consequence that had fallen in the sector since May.

From Lenorah the rain moved to the valley east of Lenorah dropping down about an inch over a part of the Valley View community.

"The precipitation was minus any high wind or hail, just an old fashioned type with the rain drops soaking into the cultivated crop lands," Springer said. Answering a question of importance to his community, Springer declared the cotton is doing fine with little harm being done by insects.

**Hall Says One Run-Off Race Set For Aug.**

Only possible run-off election in Martin County August 23 is between candidates for associate justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1, Morgan Hall, county Democratic Party chairman said this week.

The run-off race will be between Robert W. Hamilton, former Martin County official and J. Edwin Smith, Houston. Bob Hamilton lacked but a few thousand votes defeating both of his opponents in the July primary. He carried Martin County and all other West Texas counties by heavy majorities.

All local races were decided last Saturday. Hall pointed out that local candidates would have been entitled to a refund but for the one run-off race.

**Elbert Steele Still Winning Poultry Prizes**

Elbert Steele is busy these days putting Big Lake on the poultry map.

Steele, former Stanton vocational agriculture teacher, now of Big Lake, established some sort of district record with his poultry-feeding operation while residing in Martin County.

Steele and his two daughters, Deanna and Linda, received a nice writeup in the San Angelo Times one morning last week.

The article gives the former Stanton teacher credit for starting a poultry program in Reagan County second to none. It says the Big Lake instructor has been responsible for a lot of FFA boys putting aside lamb raising projects for the poultry venture.

The article says: "In his six years at Stanton Steele established one of the state's top FFA poultry-feeding operations. He's well on the way to doing the same at Big Lake."

"It's not only Steele's FFA boys who've done well. His own two daughters, Deanna, 11, and Linda, 9, have won an unusual share of honors. In the last two years they've sold \$4,276 worth of champion capons that won top places at big shows. Linda has never been defeated in her one year of showing. Deanna, who has fed two years, has been defeated only by Linda.

"In the last five years, capon

and fryer champions in the Houston shows netted Steele, his Big Lake and Stanton FFA boys and his two daughters \$9,746. Among the winners have been six grand champions and five reserve champions. One pen of five fryers sold for \$2,500.

"In the last four years at the Abilene show, Steele and his youngsters have netted \$1,640, including 14 grand champions and nine reserve grand champions.

"One reason for Steele's success probably is that he breeds, hatches, caponizes and raises his own chickens.

"For a number of years he has been working with a cross-bred chicken that has shown good possibilities and records. It is a Cornish Game and White Rock cross with from 5/8 to 3/4 Cornish.

"We want to keep the round, plump breast of the Cornish and the size and feathering qualities of the White Rock, said Steele.

"All of Steele's breeding stock was destroyed in a fire in 1945. All he had left was 13 eggs. Starting with these, he began to build.

"Early this year his youngest daughter exhibited grand champion capon of the Abilene show with a 3/4 Cornish-1/4 White Rock from Steele's own flock.

### BIBLE COMMENT

#### Only A Society Based On Love Can Be Free

Communism is a challenge to Christians to make their Christianity real. It is a golden opportunity to prove to the world that a free society established on the idea of love, and emphasizing the principles that Jesus taught, offers more hope to humanity than totalitarian power.

Many people are looking on the church today as a barrier against communism. They are hoping it will block atheistic communism especially.

The things Jesus emphasized were not concerned with material power and authority. These are the tokens of earthly kingdoms and kingdoms. His emphasis was on such things as ideas, faith, vision and the motives that control conduct.

Pilate asked Jesus, "Art thou a king?"

Jesus answered, "Thou sayest that I am a king. To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the

truth. Everyone that is of the truth heareth my voice."

Pilate did not take Jesus seriously, merely shrugging, "What is the truth?" Then he joked with Jesus' enemies, asking, "Shall I crucify your king?"

But it was the soldiers who gave history its most noble crown when they jestingly wove the crown of thorns and jammed it on His head. They carried their brutish joke a step further, robbing Him in purple and calling: "Hail, King of the Jews!"

Today the "King of the Jews" has become, in a sense, King of the world. Some mistook His intent, believing He meant to establish an earthly kingdom. They used this to report Him to Roman authorities.

Others, His friends, hailed Him as the Messiah who had come to build a kingdom on earth. But to His friends, Jesus gave the assurance that His was a spiritual kingdom ruling the hearts, not the nations, of men.

### LEGAL NOTICE

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. S.J.R. #1—Number One on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 5 and 24 and authorizing a new Section of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of the members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol, providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, pending upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of each Legislature shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government, which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor, bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to the House.

"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article 17 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.'"

Section 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than one hundred and twenty (120) days during the First Regular Session, sixty (60) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (30) days during any Called Session.

Section 3. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 24a to read as follows:

Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may determine.

Section 4. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all bills and resolutions shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for Members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

Section 5. That the Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Retail Sales In West Texas Indicate Tremendous Gain

Retail sales in West Texas increased by nearly \$5 million a day in 1957, a survey published by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce reveals.

Based on figures developed by Sales Management magazine, the West Texas Chamber's region advanced retail sales last year by almost \$200 million compared with 1956 totals.

In addition to regional advances, the survey also shows that several West Texas counties moved forward in national rankings among the top 200 counties in the United States.

Tarrant (Fort Worth) moved from 45th to 44th in the nation in retail sales; El Paso advanced from 111th to 106th; Lubbock moved from 173 to 162, and Potter (Amarillo) jumped from 185 to 175.

The survey, which was published in the July issue of the regional chamber's monthly magazine, West Texas Today, also contained information about West Texas' effective buying income. According to the survey, West Texas effective buying income increased some \$65 million. The region also placed three counties among the top 200 in the nation in effective buying power. These counties were: Tarrant, rated at number 53; El Paso, listed at 109; Lubbock, rated at 160.

Total retail sales for the 132 counties in the West Texas Chamber's region amounted to

\$3,534,841,000 in 1957, compared with \$3,356,367,000 in 1956. Total effective buying income for the area was \$4,899,640,000.

Other information contained in the survey included a tabulation of each county's retail sales in 1957, 1956, and 1955 as well as the total effective buying income for each of the 132 counties in 1957.

In addition, the survey reported that five West Texas counties were listed in the top 200 in the nation in urban population. These included Tarrant, 43; El Paso, 80; Lubbock, 141; McLennan (Waco), 185; and Wichita (Wichita Falls), 184.

West Texas has seven cities listed in the survey as being among the top 200 in America in population. These are ranked as follows: Fort Worth, 35; El Paso, 47; Lubbock, 91; Amarillo, 103; Waco, 130; Wichita Falls, 145; and Odessa, 197.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Section 4 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing, however, that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.


Section 1. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

Section 2. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this State.

## West Texas Press Comments

The Graham Leader is authority for the news that Graham is the home of the oldest living cowboy in the state. His name is Homer Willis and he is 78 years old. He started his cowboy career on a Hollis, Okla., ranch in 1908. He rides in the Stamford Cowboy Reunion every year as the oldest cowboy.

The Leader says he gives credit for his good health to drinking good water, eating plenty of fruit, drinking no alcohol, and not smoking.

Two Italians touring the world on bicycles stopped in Memphis, Hall County, one day last week, reports The Memphis Democrat. They had made the trip from Amarillo to Memphis in one day, a distance of 120 miles. They have already covered the distance of 13,000 miles through 15 countries. One Italian is an attorney and the other an accountant. They left their

home, Torino, Italy, in the Po Valley, September 2, 1956. The Democrat said that on their bicycles they carry about 100 pounds including sleeping bags, stove, spare bike parts, and other such equipment.

## Tips On How To Remove Stains From Garments

Special finishes now being used on many cottons, linens and rayons give wrinkle-resistance, extra sheen and body to these fabrics.

Problem now is, how to remove stains from fabrics that have these special finishes. Chlorine bleaches may be used on some, according to extension clothing specialists. Other finishes are damaged by such treatment because special resins in the finish absorb and retain chlorine.

Best rule to follow, according to the USDA Agricultural Research Service, is to look for direction regarding use of bleaches on the garment. If no information is given, avoid use of chlorine bleaches on fabrics with special finishes.

Some stains cannot be removed without bleaching. In such cases use sodium perborate or a powdered bleach that contains it. Soak washable colorfast fabrics for several hours, or overnight if needed, in a warm solution containing one or two tablespoons of sodium perborate to a pint of water. Another method is to sprinkle dry bleach on the dampened spot, then dip in a pan of very hot water for a few minutes.

This reminder from the clothing specialists. Always check garments for stains before laundering, and remove. Otherwise hot water may set stains.

## Freestone Peach Crop Reported Heavy Over State

This year's crop of freestone peaches is king-size—the largest since 1947. Present indications point to a national crop of 49½ million bushels, nearly a fourth larger than last year, and slightly more than a fifth above the 10-year average.

This abundant supply has placed peaches on the USDA's plentiful foods list for August, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service as a featured food. Other fruits carried on the list are fresh and processed lemons and watermelons.

Abundant supplies of potatoes and summer vegetables are also forecast for August. Tomatoes, sweet corn, green beans, lima beans, green peppers, cucumbers, lettuce and onions are among the vegetables expected to be plentiful next month.

The early summer potato crop is estimated at nearly 10 million hundredweight, or 6 percent above last year. Harvesting of the early summer crop is running late in all areas and marketing is likely to continue into August, says the Marketing Service. Late summer output also will be abundant if acreage intentions are met.

Vegetable fats and oils round out the August list. Prospects for another large soybean crop, plus a carryover from last year, assure a plentiful supply for the months ahead.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 64, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 64, to read as follows: "Section 64. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 252, Acts of the Fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension.

"These pensions may be paid out of the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederated army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held through out the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

build up a surplus.

Hardy said the bank doesn't  
loan government money, it  
comes from private firms or in-  
dividuals who have money to  
invest. In explaining how the  
Houston bank gets its money he  
said around the tenth or twelfth  
of the month the bank of-  
ficials estimate how much  
money is needed for the next  
month's operations. Short term  
debentures are then issued and  
put on the market. In 35 years  
he said, there hasn't been one  
time when the short term in-  
vestments haven't been over-  
subscribed. If the estimate made  
of money needed during the  
month is short, then the bank  
relies on a surplus or borrows  
for 10 or 15 days.

The local association was one  
of the hardest hit associations  
during the drought period,  
Hardy said. An impairment was  
placed on the stock, but the im-  
pairment has been removed and  
there is a surplus credit this  
year.

Our salary was \$1.50 a week.

There were no restricted hours for other employees of the shop. They put in as many hours as was required to publish the paper. No overtime. Their salaries ranged from six to eight dollars a week. There would come a time to reach the payroll the help was paid off their salary with due bills on the merchants who carried advertising in the newspaper and the other half paid in cash.

The newspapers in those days had their trials and tribulations to keep their doors open as the newspapers of this day are confronted with. But the present day newspaper is oper-

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."  
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

## IN THE COTTON PATCH

By COUNTY AGENT BOB JOHNSON

Bollworm increase and light infestations of red spider are holding the attention of Martin County cotton growers, while scattered rains and hail and diseased and pupated loopers are bucking hard for the top spot. Corn-ear worms, with corn kernels rapidly becoming hard, are turning to the more succulent cotton and are changing their name to cotton bollworm. The cotton bollworms being carried by most individuals have gone into the bloom, which corresponds to the silks of corn; that could mean less damage by a single worm provided he spends his three week feeding period inside that one boll. This agent hopes that many of the bollworms found feeding in small bolls on the ground will be killed either by hot sunshine or beneficial insects before returning to the plants because worms in bolls, as most growers know are difficult, if not impossible, to control by dusting or spraying.

"Doc" Bristow was rigging up to poison but the Sunday shower and the Southern rain Monday delayed his first of the week application. Several growers poisoned Monday morning but an evaluation of the control was not available at this time.

More and more growers are starting regular cycle control measures for insects as the usual considered date of regular poisoning fades farther and farther into the past. Some talk of three or four more poisonings winding up the season sounds good, but this agent feels that it is still too early for such a statement.

Red Spider, although not a common county-wide insect, deserves mention due to the fact that several growers and this agent have found them in scattered fields. Hot, dry conditions are most favorable for rapid multiplication, but a heavy rain often checks an outbreak. Red Spider is not really a spider,

but a mite which sucks the sap from leaves and causes them to turn rusty brown, curl, and drop from the plant. These mites feed on the underside of the leaves where they lay eggs and spin delicate webs. Parathion or Aramite is recommended in the Texas Guide for Control of Cotton Insects as a spray or dust. Demeton, a systemic poison, is also recommended as a spray.

Since increased bollworm activity often occurs after rain or irrigation in a week to ten days patches should be checked for eggs and small worms during the week.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.

**SECTION 1.** Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:  
**SECTION 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.**—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the term provided in this Constitution:  
(a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Clerks; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution.

The next biennial county or precinct election of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, and the month that candidates file for "Precinct No. 1," "Precinct No. 2," etc., the officers

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





## FARM AND RANCH REVIEW

The U. S. Senate is working overtime to speed action on an abbreviated farm bill which backers claim is necessary to prevent severe hardships to thousands of farmers.

One Senator said the bill in brief would:

"Establish a minimum annual allotment of 16 million acres plus, an estimated additional 310,000 acres to assure growers of 10 acres or less of no reduction in allotments.

"Continue present cotton price supports at 75 to 90 per cent of parity for 1959 and 1960 crops.

"Encourage cotton growers to expand production by allowing growers to elect to expend their allotted acreage by 40 per cent with the stipulation they would receive lower support prices."

A Senator, member of the Senate Agricultural Committee, told the Senate that thousands of small farmers will be forced from their lands unless Congress agrees on new farm legislation at this session.

Report of the work done by cotton pests which have invaded the fields bore the information that the number of them working are more numerous in the irrigated fields than there are in the unirrigated fields. This is due supposedly because the irrigated fields afford greener pastures for the insects to feast on and the dampening effects of the cotton plants.

M. H. Nance, farming in the Tarzan community, reports his 160 acres of cotton growing on his dry land farm is doing nicely. The most damaging pest to his cotton he has to do with is the jack rabbit. They are as thick as fleas on a dog's back he says.

The insects are more numerous in the cotton on his and his mother's farm south of Stanton than his farm at Tarzan. The farm south of Stanton is irrigated. It is the irrigated farms the insects are doing the most damage, Nance says.

He reported he had 160 acres of cotton hauled out last week on the farm he has rented in Gaines County.

Weather is hampering harvest of the Rio Grande Valley cotton crop. The crop is 75,000 bales behind last year at this time. It was noted, however, for the over-all outlook is for 115,000 more bales this year than last.

The Rio Grande Valley has been assigned 10,000 braceros to assist farmers in harvesting the 1958 cotton crop. The allocation came from the regional office of the Department of Labor at Dallas.

The cotton harvesting situation is becoming acute because all bracer allotments ran out last week, and the harvest was being stepped up daily.

### IRS Agents Say Federal Tax Collections Up

Federal tax enforcement efforts in the Dallas District, covering the north half of Texas, have resulted in the recovery of \$70,430,933 in additional revenue during the fiscal year just ended—July 1, 1957, through June 30, 1958.

Russell G. Bell, Administrative Offices at Midland, Texas said that sum exceeds by \$10,660,434, or approximately 18% the amount the Internal Revenue Service recovered through its audit and collection activities during the previous fiscal year.

Of the total sum, \$39,056,656 was accounted for by the regular auditing of tax returns, \$3,101,520 came from pre-refund auditing, and \$28,272,817 resulted from the collection of delinquent accounts and securing of delinquent returns.

Most of the recovered taxes, Mr. Bell said, resulted from the collection of honest errors made by taxpayers, brought to light through IRS auditing procedures. These same examinations, he said, also showed returns which contained different interpretations of Federal Tax regulations.

A small portion resulted from the work of IRS special agents' investigations of cases in which fraud was present.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter provision and general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby, providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 11 of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"A multiplicity so providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect all of the members of the governing body."

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."
