

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."







Shooting Claimed Accident Testimony in the lengthy trial unraveled an account of a trip by Bunch and Bearden in a pickup truck last Oct. 25 from Brownfield to the scene of the fatal shooting near Silverton.

Witnesses related early in the trial that Bunch told them the shooting was an "accident."

Bunch, on the stand, said he got out of the pickup and fired one shot at a rabbit in the pickup's lights. Then, he said, with the other shell automatically in the chamber, he placed two more shells in the magazine for a load of three.

He claimed that a moment later, Bearden apparently turned off the pickup's lights because of a bad battery and started describing Mrs. Bunch, his

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
