

BARBECUED CHICKEN . . . A WONDERFUL TREATI



Take a chicken outdoors to the barbecue grill and treat the family to elegant eating. Flavored throughout with tangy sauce and accompanied by charcoal grilled corn, tossed salad and garlic bread warmed over the coals, this is one meal not soon to be forgotten.

Charcoal Grilled Barbecued Chicken

Allow time for gray ash to cover charcoal briquets, about 45 minutes. Spread coals ½" apart with poker or long stick. Shake off outer ashes just before, and occasionally during barbecuing. Brush grill with fat to keep meat from sticking.

Brush chicken broiler pieces with Barbecue Sauce or marinate in sauce while getting the fire ready. Drain off excess sauce. Set chicken on grill 6 to 8 inches from coals. Kenny Foundation Increases Medical Scholarship Grants


