The age of the Record is there to prove that at its initial "shove off" on its journey of riding the turbulent waters of journalism, the city was in the arms of frontiermen. Some were happily in possession of low-slung sidearms and had a knack for using them.

The Record played its share in lifting Colorado City by its bootstraps from its early-day environments to its present day recognition of being one of the most thriving and modern little cities in West Texas.

The present owners and publishers of the Colorado City Record are, Roy V. Fox and Joe E. Bell. During their reign of ownership the past few years they made the Record into a semiweekly newspaper.

In their short terse announcement of the Record's birthday, Fox and Bell said . . . "the Record chronicles the news and history of its people and stands as grassroots bulwark against invasion of the freedoms and principles of democracy." . . .
