Building to Start Soon on Apartment Complex



WORK TO START SOON—Plans are to start building these new apartments within the next 30 days, the apartments are to look something like the one shown here.

The Rogers and Rogers Investments Company of Fort Worth, Texas, is pleased to announce that all the planning is now complete and approved by "Walnut Hill" housing development in Baird. According to Mr. Bob Rogers, President of the development company, work is scheduled to start within the next 30 days and should be ready for occupancy in early spring. The continued shortage of building materials, brick and insulation, has caused this development a construction delay.

The development will consist of 24 rental units; eight one bedroom and sixteen two bedroom accommodations. All rental units will be total electric and have individually controlled heating and cooling units. All units will be equipped with electric range, vent-a-hood, refrigerator, drapes and carpet. The units were redesigned to incorporate the latest energy saving material and equipment. This energy awareness program will

include 6 inch wall insulation, with calked sil plates and polyethylene vapor barriers on walls. also, aluminum double glazed windows will be installed and exterior doors will have urethane insulation plus magnetic weather stripping. The ceilings will have 10 inches of loose filled insulation and the attic will have thermostatically powered ventilators. All units will have private entrances with covered porches and surface walks.

It is expected that these units will be rented to Baird residents who need economical housing. Mr. Rogers has indicated that these units will have local management and rental through applications with references. Similar units operated by the developer have a great appeal to the elderly who no longer need to maintain a large house and the young married couple just starting their marriage career. It is expected that applications forms will be available in Baird after January 1978.

Sue's hobbies include yard work, golf and reading. She likes all sports and is an avid fan of the Dallas Cowboys and the Baird Bears.

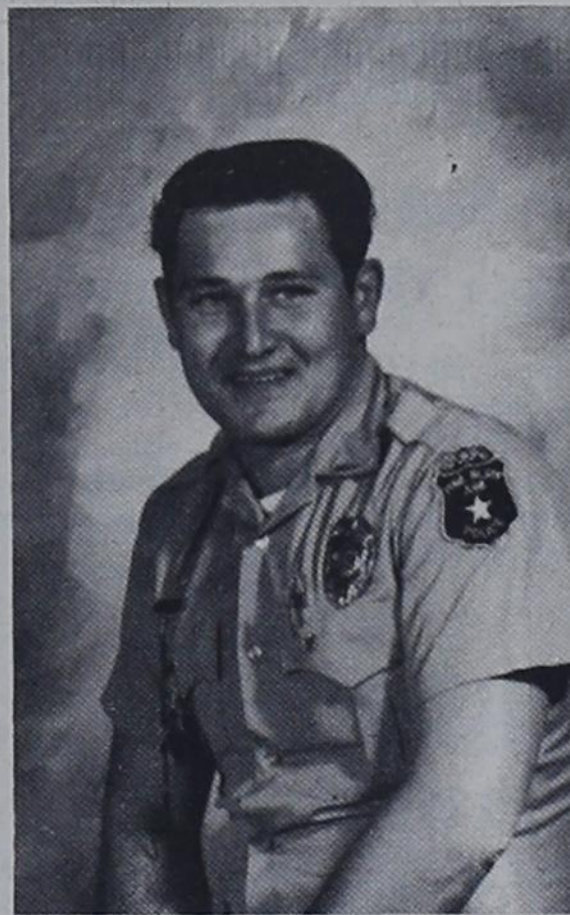

Scout Troop 222 Holds Court of Honor

The Baird Troop 222, Chisolm Taril Council, Boy Scouts of America, held a Court of Honor in the Baird High School Auditorium on Saturday evening, November 5, under the direction of scoutmaster Jack Swan and troop committee member Bill Allen.

Mr. Allen gave a brief history of the troop which was formed in December 1976 with seven boys. In March 1977 the troop participated in the Scout-O-Rama in Abilene and earned a blue ribbon.

In May they attend the Spring Camp-out and earned two red ribbons. Then, in June they had an overnight camp-out. Several of the boys went to Camp Tonlaw at Buffalo Gap in July with Weldon Moore and Bill Allen as sponsors. The boys earned a number of skill and merit awards at this camp.

Four boys attended the first annual leadership camp at Tonkawa in September and again earned some awards.

The troop now has eighteen boys who have earned a total of 61 skill awards and 75 merit badges, along with five tenderfoot, four second class, two first class and one Star progress. The boys continue to work and most of them are aiming for the Eagle award which is the highest award in scouting.

The troop has received \$150.00 pay back from the Abilene Council and \$190.00 from Cen-Tex Opportunities (\$95.00 of this went to our CUB Scout Packs).

With the money the BOy Scout Troop received they purchased two tents, one dining canopy and two dutch ovens.

A special thnaks is also given to Judge Dyer, Commissioners Court, the carpenters and the D.P.S. officers, and all others who have helped in any way with the re-modeling of the old County Jail so that it can be used as a scout hut. Oil News

Turtle Production co. of Abilene completed a Moutray Sand well in the regular field three miles southwest of Eula in Callahan County.

Location is 460 feet from the south and 2,190 feet from the east lines of Section 29, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 17 barrels of 40 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 1,416-22 feet.

The pay was treated with 400 gallons of mud-acid and fractured with 100 barrels of water and five sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4.5 inch casing at 1,453 feet, two feet off bottom.

A well was completed for four miles east of Baird in

Putnam, west (Duffer) Field.

It is a Crown Exploration Co. of Abilene No. 1-78 Brown, spotting 467 feet from the south and 1,872 feet from the east lines of Section 78, BOH Survey.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of seven barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 200 barrels of water.

Production is from perforations at 3,974-85 feet, treated with 4,500 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4.5 inch casing at 4,153 feet, and the hole bottomed at 4,171 feet,

Jones co. LTD of Albany will drill No. 24 Snyder-Williams Tannehill Unit in the regular field eight miles northeast of Baird.

The planned 1,100 foot venture is located on a 440 acre lease.

It spots 3,310 feet from the north and 220 feet from the west lines of Section 1, C&M Survey.

Eddy Dickerson Received Four Years Probation

Eddie Jay Dickerson of Clyde, who was charged with the August 13th burglary of the Radio Shack in Clyde, has received probation for four years. Eddie plead guilty in 42nd District Court before Judge Don Lane. Eddie's attorney

representing him was John Weeks of Abilene.

Eddie was ordered to make \$75.15 restitution to the store owner for the damages that occurred. This was one of the terms of his probation.
