

A college education in the 1960's will be a necessity, not a luxury, according to the annual Kiplinger report on future business growth and population changes. Futhermore, the next decade will see a 75 per cent increase in the number of college graduates.

Thorough screening at entrance and in freshman and sopho more years will produce students of even higher caliber than today's, for colleges cannot afford to expand enough to carry the full load of all who want to go to college.

Colleges and universities will face more of the same problems they face today-expansion pains in physical facilities, teacher shortages and payroll problems. Elementary and high schools which are overcrowded now, won't find the going any easier in the

In the next 10 years . . . more jobs, more pay for college grads. The average college grad in past earned \$100,000 more in a lifetime than the high school grad. This gap is likely to widen,

What does this increase in the college-educated mean? According to Kiplinger, "a higher culture." "Twice as high a proportion of college grads means some changes in popular tastes. And the business world is already looking ahead to such changes. More books, more music, more art; more foreign travel; different advertising appeals aimed at the sophisticated. News, TV, radio programs directed to the better educated."

The report states that food habits will change - less fat, starch and sugar-a direct effect of the expansion of brain power and decline of muscle power in the automated world ahead.

Also, there will be a faster shift to higher quality clothing, all lines. Less rough utility, more adornment. Formality down, informality up . . . so more sportswear, casual wear.

Even politicians face a new audience that will want more facts, less emotion, exaggeration and demagoguey. Voters will even go so far as to pay bigger salaries to attract high caliber men into politics, the report concludes.

Spreading cities, fast-growing highway networks, and a tremendous boost in construction of homes will change the face of the nation in the next decade, according to a report published here by the Kiplinger Washington Editors.

To take on new businesses and enterprises, cities will have to fan out. Suburbs will grow and join other suburbs from adjoining cities, creating new residential and shopping centers between

New houses will be built at the rate of a million and a half a year by the late 60's, a gain of around 40 per cent over present

"To relieve growing congestion highway networks will grow faster, but in doing so will create new congested areas not originally imagined. Commuting distances will be longer, so more

families will have two cars," the report states. "Farms will be larger and will utilize more machinery. Many of today's farmers will be tempted by wages from nearby plants, many of them in the farm areas. Some farmers will even move into the cities, become part-time farmers and commute to the farm to oversee it, thus holding two jobs simultaneously," Kip-

"With expansion of the cities, local civic problems will increase. Higher local taxes will be levied to support all the special services needed," predicts Kiplinger. "More police and fire services. Better water supplies, health and sanitation with increased faci-

lities. More electric power. More telephones." Along with the increase in city size, growth rate of certain states will rise. Alaska will be the fastest growing state with a population increase of 97 per cent by 1970. Nevada will increase 92 per cent, Arizona, 79 per cent, Florida, 65, California, 57, and

Delaware, 52 per cent. Other states with population growth with 30 per cent or more are Maryland, 45; Utah, 44; Michigan, 43; Colorado and New Mexico, both 42; Oregon, 38; Ohio, 37; Texas, 34; Washington, 33; Indiana, 32; and Connecticut and New Jersey, 30 per cent.

The population shift, however, will result in some states losing their present population. A drop of 20 per cent is predicted for Arkansas; Mississippi, 6 per cent; Oklahoma, 4 per cent and Vermont, 1/2 per cent.
