Salt Vital In Milk Production

Some months ago I listed the striking behavior of cows that had been deprived of salt in the pioneer salt requirement test by Dr. S. M. Babcock soon after the turn of the century. Even though the test cows were more or less average producers they reacted drastically to a they reacted drastically to a salt deficiency in their rations.

Now, nearly fifty years later, S. E. Smith and associates at Cornell University have similar saltwithholding test but with distinctly

above-aver-age cows. We might expect these cows, capa-ble of producing 14,000 pounds of milk annually, to show even

of milk annually, to show even more severe symptoms of salt deficiency than the "average" cows tested by Doctor Babcock.

Let us read what the experimenters themselves have to say: "These cows fed no supplemental salt quickly showed a craving for salt. Within two weeks they made marked efforts to get salt when teased with block salt. They progressed to the point of depraved appetites in which urine, feees, dirt and other abnormal objects were licked or consumed, apparently in an atconsumed, apparently in an at-tempt to get needed salt. About

that she was unable to stand, had a body temperature of 96° F., marked abnormality of heart beat and a complete apheart beat and a complete appetite failure for both feed and water. The attending veterinarian gave the opinion that death was probable in a few hours. A quarter-pound of salt was presented to the cow and she consumed this avidly at about 4 p.m. At 5 a.m. she was up, looked bright, consumed feed and water and went on to an uncomplicated recovery."

This surely is abundant proof that salt is doubly necessary for animals that are bred for, and capable of, high performance. Such animals should have one per cent salt in their grain ration along with freechoice salt available at all times. Road Bids

Question: Are cattle on

spring pasture more apt to suf-fer from "grass staggers" than later on, and can anything be done to prevent it or cure it?

Answer: "Grass staggers," also called "grass tetany" and "wheat poisoning," depending on the nature of the pasture, on the nature of the pasture, occurs in many parts of the country, or the world for that matter. It suggests an imbalance of minerals in much of the lush green pasture, especially in reference to an excess of calcium, which causes available magnesium to be less well assimilated. A drench of magnesium sulfate (Epsom Salts) is usually a successful treatment. It should be noted that cows on such succulent pasture crave more salt than they do tempt to get needed salt. About the eighth month serious symptoms developed. At this time appetites began to fail along with a precipitous decline in body weight as well as milk production.

"Cow 90 became so deficient" is usually a successful treatment. It should be noted that cows on such succulent pasture crave more salt than they do later on. It is wise to humor them in this respect and to be sure they have free access to salt at all times.



When he is satisfied that he has found it, he toses out a floating styrofoam buoy. Wrapped around the buoy and attached to it is a 50foot length of rope, on the other end of which is a heavy weight.

As the buoy hits the water it begins to spin at a terrific rate, indicating that the rope is unwinding as the leaden weight begins to sink. Once the rope is completely unwound, the buoy comes to a standstill and marks one side of the area to be fished.

He repeats the process as he circles the area, to mark off the other extremity of the fishing hole. Then he lets down anchor and the fun begins.

Everyone is given a short, heavy rod equipped with about 60-lb.-test line, and a sturdy, deep sea fishing To the end of the line is attached
