Ranchmen Seek Injunction To Halt Pecos School Tax

A suit seeking an injunction against the assessment of taxes on property within the Pecos Independent School District has been filed in 143rd District Court in Pecos this week.
Plaintiffs in the suit claim that ranchlands owned by them in Reeves County are unfairly taxed in comparison to the levies on farm lands and other real estate within the district. The suit seeks to prevent the district from collecting the taxes until a court ruling is handed down.
Bringing the suit were Jim Deakins, Marvin E. Clark and W. H. Holcomb and 12 non-residents of the district.
The ranchman group claims the current valuation of their lands, \$3.50 an acre, is too high and that their valuation should be decreased, or the other lands—farm lands—should be increased.
The school district denied discrimination in its tax valuation method. Non-residents listed as plaintiffs in the injunction suit are James Z. Curtis and S. L. Dennis, both of New Mexico; J. M. Crews of Childress; Noel W. Reynolds; Bank of the Southwest National Assn. of Houston, all doing business as T-Diamond Ranch Co.
Also, J. Marvin Rape of Tom Green County, H. A. Lindley of Loving County, W. A. and Josephine Grisham, both of Taylor County, J. F. Burford of Midland and C. M. Caldwell of Taylor County.

STEADY AFTER RECOVERY

State Business Outlook Calls For Few Gains

The Bureau of Business Research reports that Texas business, after recovering from the decline coinciding with the steel strike, has failed to expand.
The level of business activity for several months apparently will continue on a current plateau.
Expectations Fall Short
April activity was not as good as expected earlier. The bureau said that while there are no major indications of a decline there are very few signs of further advance appearing.
The index of business activity compiled from bank debits in leading Texas cities dropped two per cent from March but was three per cent above April 1959. For the first four months of the year, the index was eight per cent higher than a year earlier.
The index includes such factors as freight carloadings, crude petroleum, electric power consumption, bank debits, life insurance sales, retail sales, industrial production and building.
Retail Sales Increase
Retail sales increased 9 per cent performance with an increase of 18 per cent and all types of durable goods stores except motor vehicle dealers reflected an increase.
The nation's petroleum industry plans to spend \$6,600,000,000 in 1960 in capital and exploration expenses with a continuation of the high level of spending expected through 1963. The 1960 expenditures include an increase of 35 per cent in processing, 24 per cent in transportation, 18 per cent in marketing and 5 per cent for drilling and production.
