## 27th Annual Farm Convention To Be Held In Dallas Nov. 9

The 27th annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau will be held November 9-12 in Dallas, according to J. H. West of Bishop, president of the state farm organization.

State policies to guide the organization through 1961 will be adopted at the convention. Adopted resolutions on national issues will become recommendations to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention scheduled for December 11-15 in Denver.

Some 750 voting delegates will represent 199 organized county Farm Bureaus in the voting. Total attendance is expected to reach about 1,700.

Speakers at this year's convention include West, Congressman Omar Burleson, Anson; Roger Fleming, Washington, D. C., secretary-treasurer of the American Farm Bureau Federation; Ed Lipscomb, Memphis, Tenn., public relations director for the National Cotton Council; and Mrs. Haven Smith, Chappell, Neb., chairman of the AFBF's Women's Committee.

Leon C. Burns, minister of the Central Church of Christ, Cleburne, will be vesper speaker.

A 39-member state resolutions committee, composed of one state director and two lay members from each of the 13 districts in Texas, will convene Monday, November 7. This group will have the responsibility of drafting tentative resolutions from hundreds of recommendations on scores of issues sent in from county annual conventions. The TFB voting delegates will begin considering these tentative resolutions Friday afternoon, November 11. The business session will continue next day until all tentative resolutions have been either rejected, amended or adopted.

Registration for the convention will get under way at 2 p.m., November 9, in the lobby of the Hotel Adolphus. A "talk meet" and "talent fad" for Farm Bureau young people will begin at 3:30 p.m. in the Baker Hotel. The vesper service will be that evening in the Adolphus.

## Farm Housing Regulations Changed

Under a recent change in the eligibility requirements for farm housing loans, a farmer who owns a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities may, if he meets other eligibility requirements, be able to obtain a farm housing loan.

Previously, according to Delton M. Costlow, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Martin, Midland and Andrews counties, an applicant had to own a farm that would produce a substantial amount of the operator's income.

Farm housing loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration and are used to construct and repair needed farm houses and farm service buildings. During the past three years, five loans totaling \$63,660.00 have been advanced for this purpose in Martin and Midland counties.

Other eligibility requirements are that the applicant lacks the resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere, be a citizen of the United States, and have sufficient income from farm and other sources to pay farm operating and family living expenses and money payments when due, on his debts.

Applications for this type of credit may be made at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration located in the First National Bank Building in Stanton.

## Farmers Will Ballot On Dec. 13 On Cotton Quotas For 1961

Cotton growers will vote December 13 in their annual referendum to determine whether to use a system of marketing quotas Stabilization and Conservation Committee has announced.

If approved in the referendum, this would be the eighth successive year in which quotas have been in effect for upland cotton.

Cotton quotas have been proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture on the basis of an official determination that the estimated total supply of cotton for 1960-61 will amount to approximately 21.7 million running bales, or about 3 million bales above normal.

The law requires the proclamation of quotas by October 15 in any year when the total supply exceeds normal. Quotas do not take effect, however, unless approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum.

The national cotton allotment for 1961, has been determined at 18,398,424 acres, compared with 16 million acres in 1960. This 1961 national allotment, plus a national reserve of \$0,000 acres, will be broken down to states and counties, and individual farm allotments will be made available to producers before the referendum.

The 1961 farm allotments as compared to 1960 may vary considerably in the extent to which they reflect.

If marketing quotas are approved in the December 13 referendum, price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments at a level within the range of 70 to 90 per cent of parity. As in other years, the exact level of price support will be determined later.

Growers who exceed their farm acreage allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 per cent of the June 15, 1961, parity price on the farm's excess production of the crop. In addition, none of the upland cotton produced on the farm will be eligible for price support.

If marketing quotas are disapproved for 1961, acreage allotments will remain in effect and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 per cent of parity, as provided by law.

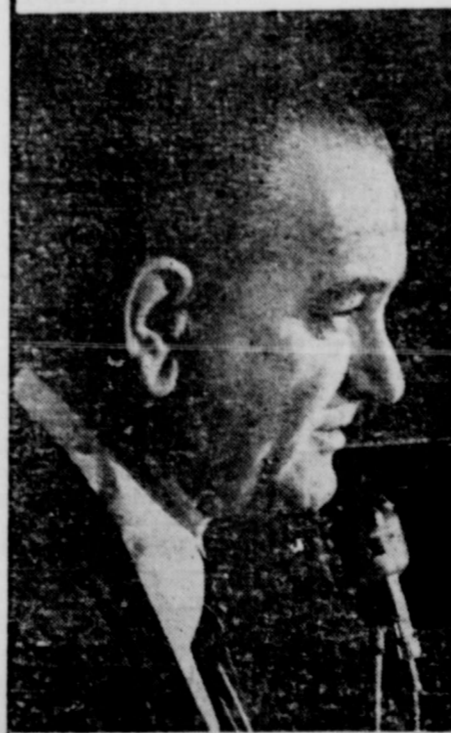

### 29,900 Bales Processed In Martin County

Martin County has only 27 per cent of its estimated 1960 cotton crop ginned, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

The crop estimated for the county is 72,575 bales, with 29,900 bales processed.

Glasscock County has ginned 6,870 bales of its estimated 10,205 bale total.

Howard County gins have processed 20,500 bales of an estimated 30,620 bale crop.

Dawson County has 77,270 bales ginned representing 30 per cent of its estimated 160,000 bale crop.

Borden County has ginned 6,900 bales. This is about half of its total crop.

Mitchell County ginned 1,959 bales last week. The total is now 10,854 or 36 per cent of the crop. Only about 45 per cent of the crop is ready for harvesting. Much acreage in the area is planted to late cotton.

Scurry County has ginned 6,989 bales. Its week's turnout was 1,866. This is 35 per cent of its crop which is about half ready for picking.

Fisher ginned 2,748 bales last week for a season total of 13,452. This is about 38 per cent of the crop. The cotton is 85 per cent open.

Nolan County has 44 per cent of its crop harvested. It reported 1,244 bales ginned last week for a total of 7,165 bales.
