More meat is in sight for you next

Facts gathered by the Agricultural Marketing Service point to supplies large enough to provide 165 pounds of meat per person next year, compared to an estimate of 161 pounds

In 1956, the meat supply averaged lmost 167 pounds per person, but that was the only year on record when there was more meat than you may look forward to in 1961.

More than half of the meat supply, and most of the increase over 1960, will be in beef, because ranchers and farmers have been building up their beef cattle herds for the past three

There are two big reasons why the weekly and small town daily newspapers are becoming increasingly influential in congressional elections. One is the gradual change over the past 50 years from highly partisan efforts of the editor of the papers to greater emphasis on reporting the facts without political bias.

Another is the fact that in small towns the subscribers either know the editor personally, or they know him by reputation. In a large majority of cases the editor is far more interested in the is in partisan politics.

It is doubtful if there ever has been a national election in which the voters were better informed than the one held last Nov. 8, or one in which the candidates and the issues were better understood by the great majority.



### Food Supplies, Prices In 1961

Here's how the Agricultural Marketing Service sees it, based on facts concerning national food stocks, crops, demand and consumption. Food supplies through 1961 will be

the increase just about matching the increase in population. Retail food prices in 1961 may average no higher than this year, reflecting the continued large sup

plies in prospect and continued high consumer income. Consumer demand for food is expected to remain strong since general economic activity and employment likely will be well maintained

with the flow of income to consumers continuing at a high level. Accordingly, overall consumption of food per person likely will be at about the same rate as in 1960.

So, as it looks now to AMS, civilians can expect to have more beef, veal and poultry meat per person than in 1960.

Pork consumption per person is ikely to be at a lower rate than 1960 during most of next year, but consumption in the closing months may exceed year-earlier levels.

Small increases are expected for margarine and frozen vegetables. Some reductions from 1960 per capita levels are indicated for dairy products, eggs and canned juices. Little change is expected in civilian per capita consumption of other ma-

#### Calcium - Phosphorus Must Be Balanced

Livestock rations containing calcium greatly in excess of phosphorus have been found to reduce the digestibility or availability of protein, phosphorus, iodine, iron, manganese, and zinc. These rations have reduced rate and economy. assimilation of other minerals, particularly phosphorus. A calcium-phosphorus ratio of 2 to 1 or higher impairs the utilization of the phosphorus of phytic acid. Too much calcium in the diet of chicks depresses assimilation of manganese iodine. have reduced rate and economy gain in swine. When fed to dry cows such lation of manganese, iodine,

In experiments with dry cows, California workers used low-calcium rations, no legume forage and no supplemental calcium. The ration kept the para-thyroid glands active and responsive to sudden demands for calcium in the blood on freshening, resulting in decreased incidence of milk fever.

It seems the high calcium rations frequently fed to dairy cows do not benefit them, but are a tribute to the cow's ap-parent ability to tolerate them. What harm is done from a de-pressing effect of excessive calcium on the absorption of other nutrients is not readily evident, but this undesirable effect has been proved.

Question: I read where Cornell University reported milking cows got enough salt from salt blocks. Does this mean that with access to salt blocks we do not need to mix any loose salt with the grain?

Answer: The Cornell test was conducted with cows on pasture, therefore in the warm time of year and favorable for licking block salt. Considering the fact that salt blocks are used in various ways, at times in barn yards and during cold winter weather, it is advisable to mix one percent salt in the grain, with additional block or loose salt in suitable containers and accessible to the cows.

Eric Brantner is a frail and appealing little boy who achieved the age of two years the other day in his crossroads home at Palouse,

Held in his mother's arms on that great day, blue-eyed Eric could recognize his birthday well-wishers, among them his dancing hound-dog, Jupiter.
But not so long ago, Eric wasn't
given much time by most doctors to enjoy Jupiter or other
members of the household. He was born three months prematurely and also developed an enlarged head (hydrocephalus) due to excess fluid on the brain His despairing parents, Gail and Vonda Brantner, did not believe that a second birthday was in the cards for Eric.

Then, as the head grew alarmingly larger on the insub-stantial body, members of the Whitman County Chapter of The National Foundation came forward with an offer of March of Dimes funds if they were needed for patient aid.

They were urgently needed. Eric was rushed to Sacred Heart Hospital in Spokane, 65 miles away. There, at the age of 10 months, he underwent surgery for nearly four hours. The surplus fluid was drained away, relieving the pressure on the brain caused by blockage, and a plastic tube was inserted to keep the accumulating serted to keep the accumulating fluid flowing from the head to

Although Eric's appearance today belies his two years—the little boy looks scarcely more than six months old—the doctors' view is that he now has a good chance of survival. He cannot sit up by himself and he is only just learning to toddle uncertainly in a baby walker. 




