for many years. ERNIE also served in World War Two, and hit Normandy on D-Day. As the late GEN. GEORGE PATTON'S troops rushed across France, SANCHEZ saw the military display all the way. Combat correspondents many of them-were in the big push. Stories written about the invasion were flashed back steadily, but some of the fellows didn't make it back-they died in battle. The other morning we bought a broom from ERNIE and for some reason or the other, he asked: "Have you ever had a woman whip you with a broom?" I couldn't recall such an experience. But I did ask my friend why he ever thought that a woman had used a broom on me. He answered, "Well, you have been everywhere and done lots of things, and seen a lot of mixed up action, so I thought somewhere down the line a woman might have whipped you with a broom." I'm still figuring his angle.

**R**ECENTLY we published a recipe for chili and one for hot-water combread. Without passing along a special recipe we give our readers a few lines on the origin of desserts.
