The well pumped 115 barrels of 31.5-gravity oil, plus four per cent water, from open hole at 4,663.4; 751 feet in 24 hours, after acidizing with 6,500 gallons. Gas-oil ratio was nil.

The 4 1/2-inch casing is cemented at 4,663 feet.

Gil Jones To File Motion For New Trial

A verdict was returned by a Martin County jury in 118th District Court Sunday afternoon upholding the validity of a will left by the late Mrs. Nettie Milhollon of Stanton.

In her will Mrs. Milhollon left her estate to a trust fund for educational loans to needy and underprivileged boys and girls. She specified the fund be administered by the First National Bank of Stanton.

The will was contested by several nieces and nephews. The estate has been estimated in excess of \$250,000.

The will, executed in 1944, was contested on grounds of "testamentary capacity and undue influence, according to Attorney General Will Wilson who was made a party to the suit. As attorney general, Wilson was brought into the suit under a state law requiring his participation "for and on behalf of the general public in charitable trust matters."

Gil Jones, of Big Spring, attorney for the relatives of the late Mrs. Milhollon attempting to break the will, said he will file a motion for a new trial.

Jones stated that he would seek the motion in the same court before the same judge who presided at the trial which lasted for a full week.

Jones said that in the event the motion for a new trial was not allowed that he would file an appeal to the court of civil appeals in El Paso, Texas.

Jones is the district attorney for the 118th judicial district.

The defense was represented by a battery of attorneys.

Philosopher Advises Big Cities That Problems Won't End When They Get New Department

Editor's note: The Martin County Philosopher on his grass farm on Mustang Draw lets international problems slide this week and discusses city affairs.

Dear editor:
According to a new article I found squeezed in between news about all the whooping and hollering and threatening to shoot now going on in the world, President Kennedy, in between international crises, has asked Congress to create a new department of the government to be known as the Department of Urban Affairs, with cabinet rank.



Its purpose is to help cities deal with their growing problems, it was announced, sort of like the Department of Agriculture has been helping us farmers for years.

As I understand it, big cities are all in favor of this new Department, but I would like to give them just one word of advice, with the understanding of course that when somebody offers one word of advice it's usually a lot of words.

Now it's true that cities have a lot of problems and they're growing more numerous and probably worse all the time and certainly something ought to be done about it and if Midland and New York can't handle their problems, it seems natural, if unplanned by the founding fathers, for them to turn to Washington.

But here's what I was thinking: these big cities shouldn't get their hopes up too high. I mean, after they get a Department of Urban Affairs set up and going strong, they shouldn't give a sigh of relief and figure they've got smooth sailing.

The Department of Agriculture has been working on us farmers' problems for years and so far we've managed to stay at least fifteen problems ahead. I don't know where we'd been without the Department of Agriculture, no doubt in much worse shape except for one or two periods in there, but as a man from a group with some experience with a special Department in Washington, I'd like to suggest to the big cities that problems won't go away as soon as their Urban Department is created. It may be years before their Department can solve their problems. Say two million.

Bible Comment—

Sacredness Of Human Life Must Be Recognized

Insistence on the sacredness of human life did not begin with Jesus. It was part of the noble tradition of Israel that He had come to fulfill, not to destroy.

One of the first references to the sacredness of human life is found in the tale of Cain's murder of his brother, Abel. Later the story of Abraham is another example of this attitude. 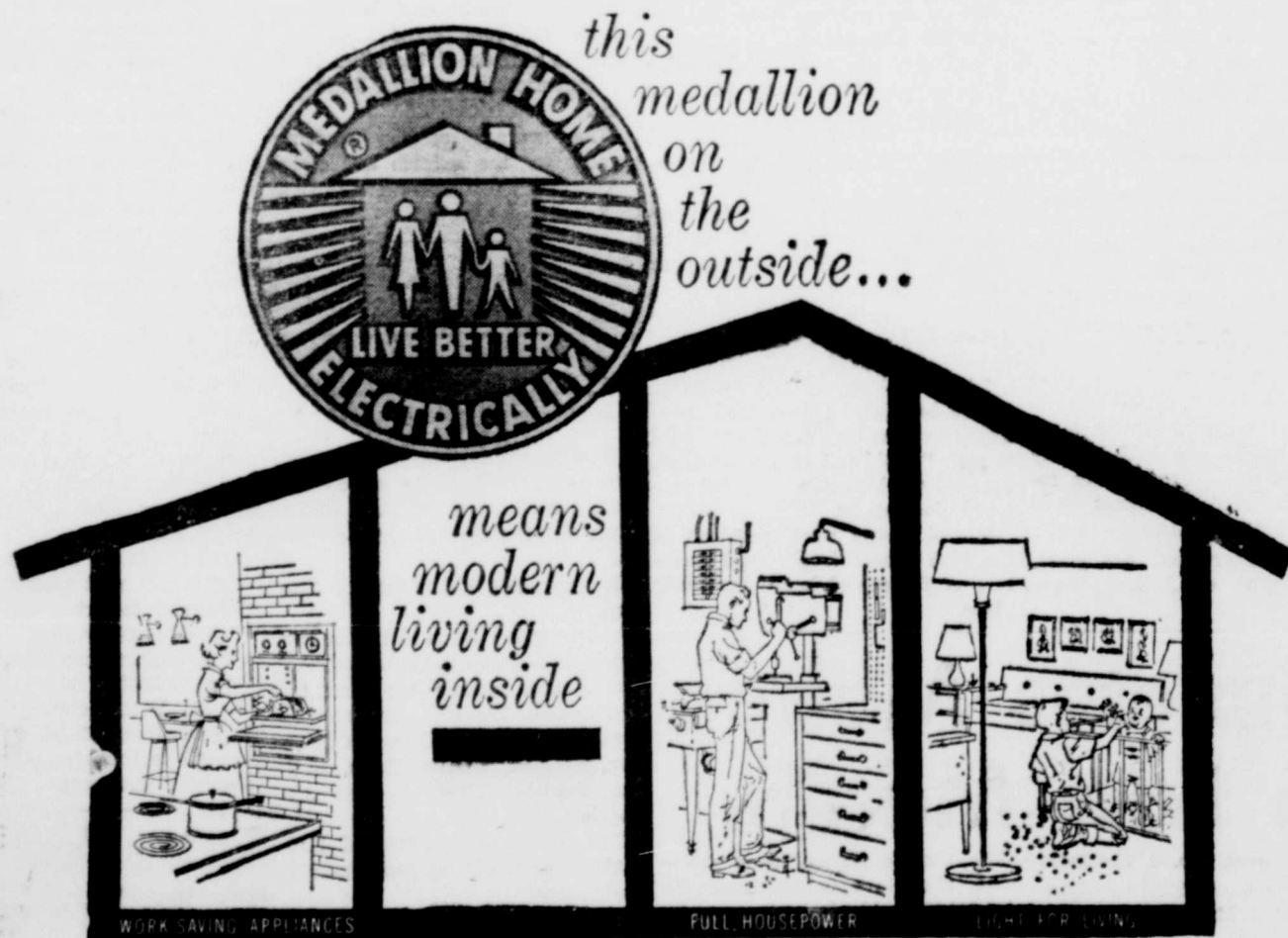

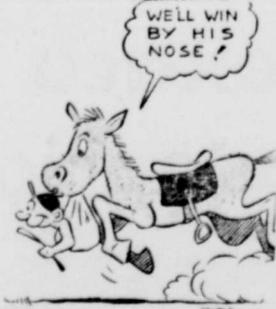

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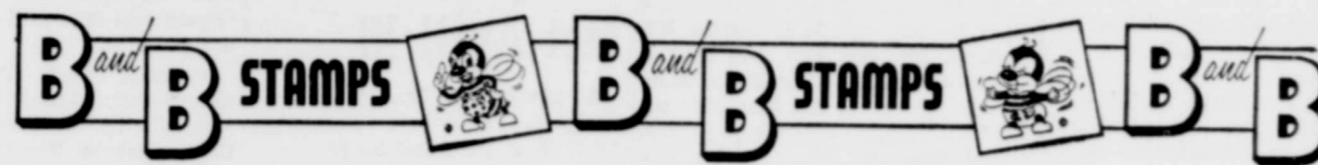
