GENERAL WAGGONER CARR, a lot of Texans think RAILROAD COMMISSION-ER WILLIAM MURRAY, JR., was not acting in the best interest of either Texas or himself, when he accepted an interest for a reportedly small consideration in a West Texas oil lease and watched the gross pyramid to \$285,-000 for his part. Regardless of the outcome, GOV. JOHN CONNALLY'S administration must face up to the fact that this thing "broke" just a few months after great confidence was expressed in the official family in Austin. CARR says CONNALLY has welcomed a state investigation. We hope so for his sake. With the MURRAY thing coming on top of widespread slant-hole drilling scandals in East Texas, something needs to be done immediately. Personally, we feel that MR. MURRAY has served his usefulness to Texas and should resign. Maybe this business of long-term in office does something to men-MURRAY has been down there in Austin on the Railroad Commission for 16 years. THE LONGVIEW NEWS this week asked in an editorial for a full-scale legislative investigation into the "troubled" affairs of the Texas oil industry. The editorial referred to MURRAY'S dealings and to a 1957 state law called the Code of Ethics which prohibits personal investments by state officials or employes in any enterprise, "which will create a substantial conflict between his private interest and the public interests."
