

### After Ball Over, **Do Simple Chores**


When guests have departed after a party, 20 minutes of simple chores will save a lot of work and trouble. Don't just empty ash trays; soak them overnight. Inspect bric-a-brac that may have been used as ash trays. Wipe ring-stains from table surfaces with a moistened cloth or sponge to prevent permanent stains. Remove cushions from upholstered chairs and sofas for fire prevention and check upholstery and rugs where any food and drink may have been spilled. Silver that may have been exposed to acids such as citrus or pickle juice should be washed immediately to prevent tarnish. Any glasses, dishes and pans rinsed quickly in the evening will be easier to finish cleansing the next day.
