

The big grain reservoir was caved in on the north side by the titantic wind blast. Straub estimated a two-week setback on the construction time table after the storm damage. The big grain elevator will be completed in late July. Construction work started on the big storage facility in January of this year.







TOMATO HORNWORM

This large, horned worm is perhaps the best known and most obvious tomato pest. It has a ravenous appetite to match its size. In the early spring, farmers and gardeners often plow or dig up the winter stage of the tomato

hornworm, a brown, hard-shelled pupa about 2 inches long. These pupae produce the large grayish or brownish moths with dark and white mottled markings that are frequently seen flying at dusk. Their wingspread is between 4 and 5 inches.
Although these moths don't





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

THE PRINT TOLBERT'S column in THE DALLAS NEWS a story about HENDRICK'S LAKE in Panola County, was significant to us. TOLBERT wrote that the small lake in East Texas, between Carthage and Longview, was supposed to have been the scene of some buried treasure. The legend relates that approximately \$2 million in silver bars was dumped into the lake in 1816 by a party headed by NICHOLAS (HOT HORSE) TRAMMEL. TRAMMEL was the fellow for whom the TRAMMEL TRACE was named. This was a trail for running "hot horses" and other stolen goods from southeastern Texas to Arkansas. The renowned Galveston prirate, JEAN LAFITTE captured and plundered a Spanish frigate, the Santa Rosa, in the early Spring of 1816, his last and mightiest treasure haul. LAFITTE then sent his most trusted lieutenant, TRAMMEL, up the Trace, bound for St. Louis to market the silver bars. At HENDRICK'S LAKE, the "fence" is supposed to have been intercepted by Spanish cavalry. According to the yarn he dumped the silver into the lake to keep the Spanish from getting it. It's a mystery why TRAMMEL didn't return and get the bars. The legend says he didn't. Many people have been Interesting in trying to recover the treasure. A resident of the town of Tatum, near the lake, once worked out a plan to drain the lake, but high water and the rainy weather forced him to abandon his plans. A Houston oilman organized an extensive search for the loot one year, but nothing was found. When your editor owned the newspaper in Carthage, Texas, we once joined SHERIFF CORBETT AKINS and a small group of local Panola County residents to try for the recovery of the silver bars. But to be perfectly frank about it, your scribe had little faith that any treasure would be recovered. We went along with the idea more to get away from the newspaper office in Carthage and to be with our friends than for any other purpose. Several divers helped our party try for the pirate's dumped silver and we had a gang of machinery, cables, a huge platform to work from constructed, and a lot of other gadgets but no success was forthcoming. The lake is small a mirror-like, long patch of water in heavy forest. If any of our readers would like to make the trek to HENDRICK'S LAKE to search for the silver bars, we might advise them to wait until deer season opens in East Texas. Along the edges of the lake a lot of big, red deer, come down to drink. We never failed to bag one in the area when we used to hunt in there with SHERIFF AKIN.

MRS. RAY KELLY telephone us at 12:20 a.m. Wednesday to advise about the destruction, by the wind, of the MOTEL BELVUE's renowned beacon sign. The KELLYS were up when the high velocity windstorm launched its thirty-five minute offensive in the city limits of Stanton. We talked later Wednesday morning with RAY. He informed us that the sign would be reerected as soon as possible. The derrick-type sign was the highest in town. We could see the revolving light from our front yard. It was visible at night for most of the city's residents to view. Pilots have told us they used the bouncing beacon for a directional guide. That sign told the world there was a Stanton. We are glad it is going to be put up again.

MOST of the local residents slept through the night's windy nightmare, but a few late goersto-bed, were up for the weather show. ALTON TURNER told us that he made a trip or so outside to glance skyward and while out on one trip observed the CLAUD NOWLINS inspecting their outside yard light. JOHN SHORT sought refuge behind the Texaco station walls when strange things started rolling through the driveway. MRS. BROWN, wife of the service station owner, told us at about one a.m. Wednesday morning at the station, that they had been up watching the clouds and waiting the windy offensive out since hearing a report of a possible windstorm on some tv station's ten o'clock news. DUB WEATHERFORD, night city patrolman, found a safe place to protect his police car from the storm's fury. Then after the wind faded and the rain started, he went back to patroling the highway. The elements threatened until 4 a.m. Wednesday morning. We spotted lights on in many sections of the city at that time and then the early risers learned of the night windstorm. The morning radio stations we tuned in on missed the Stanton storm story. Some of the announcers talked about the weather in Washington and Oregon, but none sounded the Stanton scoop. It was a real wet, windy night for the editor-1 had the story all by myself — there was no sunshine around-none at all.
