





er near ditches. Steep down grades, such as ramps used to load or unload the machine, should be approached by backing, explains Reeves.

When traveling on the road avoid applying the brake quickly. A mechanical cotton picker is a hearvy machine and is hard to stop, so use care when stopping it. These simple suggestions have been

proven by manufacturers and in the field, says Reeves. A few minutes devoted to safety can protect the cotton picker as well as the operator, he adds.
