## Bible Comment—

### Jesus Asks Loyalty As He Gave It To His Father

True Christianity is not an easy religion. But then Jesus never offered his disciples ease or pleasure. He offered them only "Joy." He told them to be of good cheer in a very dark hour, told them of the rich rewards in the Kingdom of Heaven, and always spoke of the sacrifice of certain things which are regarded very highly in the eyes of the world.

Jesus spoke of the Kingdom as a pearl of great price which everyone should be willing to sell everything to buy.

The distinctive things about the Jews from very ancient times was the insistence in their religion on loyalty to God. It stated in the commandment: "Thou shalt have no other Gods before me." There was no part of man's life that was free from the presence of his God. The obligation to serve God was always active and waiting to be fulfilled.

Jesus demanded no formal allegiance to Himself except in the way he gave allegiance to the Father. He did insist, however, on loyalty to the truth.

## Philosopher Will Get His Debts Up To National Average If Stores Are Willing

(Editor's note: The Martin County philosopher on his grass farm on Mustang Draw gets bogged down in figures this week, his letter reveals.)

Dear editor: I'm always hearing people complain about the national debt and then they shake their head and say, "I don't believe the Federal government will ever get out of debt."

What I'd like to know is, will anybody? What I mean is, I was reading a newspaper article last week and ran across some figures that gave me so much to think about I haven't been able to settle down to work since, and if I do work out of the slump, I'll hunt up some more.

According to them, since 1947 the Federal debt has increased by 17 per cent, while business firms increased their gross debt by 230 per cent, consumers by 390 per cent and local governments by 330 per cent.

As you can see by this, the Federal government is falling down on the job. What kind of leadership is it when Washington goes in debt only 17 per cent deeper while state and local governments are going in 330 per cent?

But the thing that fascinated me about the figures is the fact consumers have increased their debts by 390 per cent since 1947.

As I understand the whole set of figures, everybody, from Washington to state and local governments to business firms to consumers, is anywhere from 17 per cent to 390 per cent deeper in debt now than he was 15 years ago, and what I want to know is, who's got all this money to lend?

This is what floors me about finances, but in the meantime if you find out the names of any stores willing to let me bring my debts up to the national level of 390 per cent, send me their names quick. It won't be any trouble to find out how much I'd have to buy to increase my debts of 15 years ago by 390 per cent. I know what my debts were 15 years ago; I ought to, I've still got em.

John Tower

John Goodwin Tower, Republican, born in Houston, Texas, September 29, 1925, is the first Republican to be elected to the Senate from Texas since 1870. He is the only Republican ever elected by popular vote from any of the former Confederate States.

Senator Tower is assigned to two major Senate Committees — Banking and Currency and Labor and Public Welfare. He is now second ranking Republican on the Housing Subcommittee. On the Labor and Public Welfare Committee, he is ranking Republican on the Migratory Labor Subcommittee.

He is serving on the Senate Republican Campaign Committee. He is also one of four Senators on the Civil War Centennial Commission. In February, 1962, he was one of the six Senators named to the 12 member Senate-House committee to draft an affirmative statement of Republican principles.

Tower's parents are Doctor and Mrs. Joe Z. Tower. Dr. Tower, a Methodist clergyman, is Executive Secretary of the Texas Conference of the Methodist Church, with offices in Houston. Senator Tower's grandfathers were both Methodist clergymen, the late Rev. C. A. Tower and the Rev. John W. Goodwin of Atlanta, Texas.

Senator Tower is a veteran of World War II, having served three years in the Navy aboard an amphibious gunboat in the Western Pacific. He received his BA degree in Political Science from Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, in 1948. He continued graduate study and research between 1952 and 1953 at the London School of Economics of the University of London where he did extensive field research on the organization of the Conservative Party. In 1953, he was awarded his MA degree in Political Science from Southern Methodist University. In 1951 he joined the Political Science faculty at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, where he taught until June, 1960.

Tower led a field of 71 candidates in the Special Senate Election held April 4, 1961. On May 27, 1961, he won the run-off election. On June 15, 1961, Tower was sworn in as United States Senator, filling the seat vacated by Senator Lyndon Johnson. At the time of his election, Senator Tower was the youngest Senator in the 87th Congress.

Tower is married to the former Lou Bullington of Wichita Falls, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Bullington. They have three daughters: Penelope, 9; Marian, 7; and Jeanne, 6.

Senator Tower is a member of the following organizations: Southwestern Social Science Association, Texas Historical Society, American Association of University Professors, American Political Science Association, Hansard Society (British), International Political Science Association and the Kappa Sigma Fraternity. In Wichita Falls he is a member of the Board of Stewards of the Methodist Church, the Chamber of Commerce, the University Kiwanis Club, and Board of Directors of the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra. 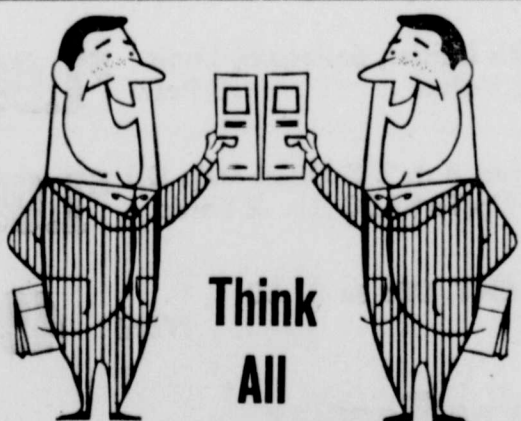

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963."

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 123 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election; form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County, provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision. "All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision shall be deposited in a special fund to be known as the 'Special Fund for Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation' and shall be held in trust for the benefit of such person and shall be available for the payment of such compensation as may be due to such person at the time of his death or disability or at the time of his retirement. The Legislature may provide for the registration of all voters."

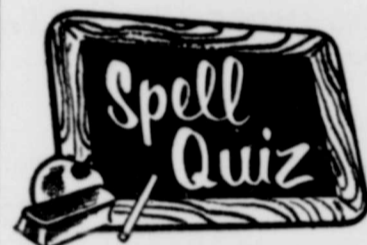

## Recipes

Banana bread makes delicious picnic sandwiches. And it's ever so good when eaten along with a fruit and cottage cheese salad. Try the following recipe and your family will think you are a very bright girl.

### BANANA BREAD

1½ cups sifted flour  
2 tps. baking powder  
¼ tsp. baking soda  
½ tsp. salt  
½ cup butter or margarine  
¾ cup sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 cup mashed ripe bananas  
Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, and salt.  
Beat shortening until creamy. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. All flour mixture

alternately with bananas, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth.

Turn into a well greased bread pan, 9x5x3 inches, and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about 1 hour and 10 minutes, or until bread is done. Recipe makes 1 loaf.

Serve this pie with any fruit you like — raspberries, strawberries, peaches, bananas, cherries. Or offer it with a blueberry glaze.

### SUMMER CREAM PIE

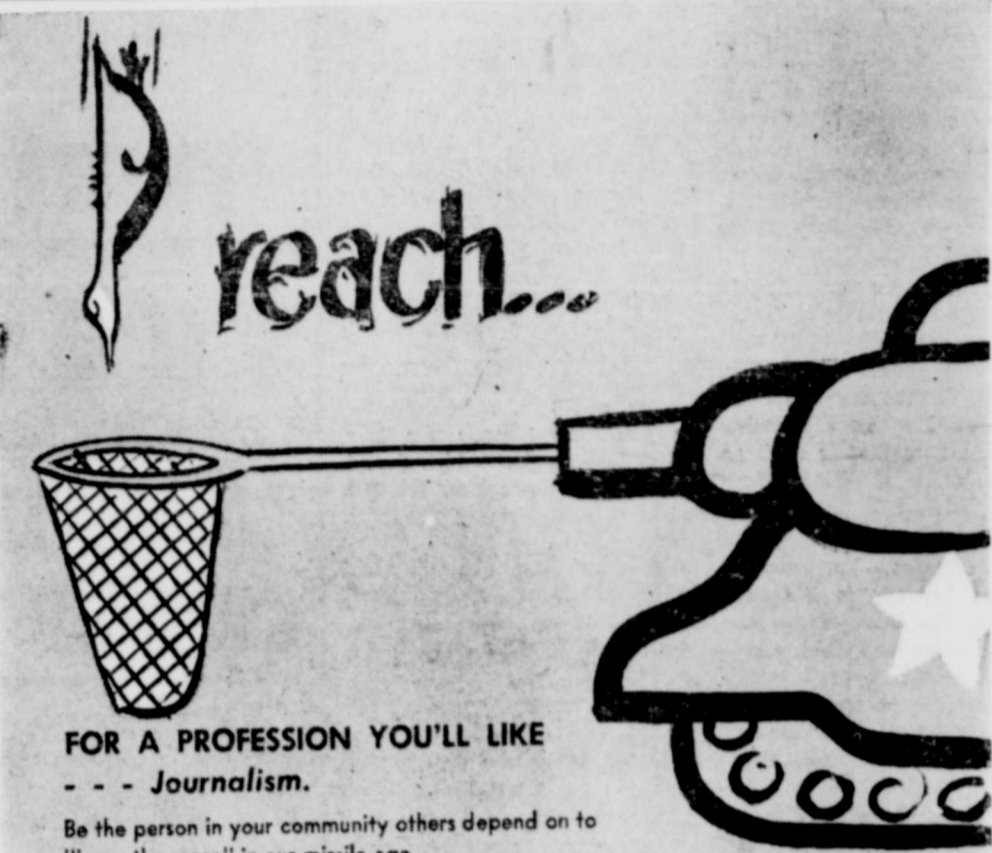
¼ cup cornstarch  
¼ tsp. salt  
½ cup sugar  
2½ cups milk  
3 egg yolks  
2 tps. butter or margarine  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Baked 9-inch pie shell

Fresh fruit  
Heavy cream  
In a heavy saucepan (1½ quarts is a good size) stir together thoroughly the cornstarch, salt and sugar. Gradually stir in milk, keeping thickens and boils; boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Beat egg yolks slightly; stir a little of the hot mixture into the yolks. Stir this mixture back gradually into the hot mixture. Return to heat; boil 1 minute more, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Stir in butter and vanilla. Cool, stirring occasionally.

Pour into baked pastry shell. Refrigerate until set — 2 to 3 hours. Garnish with fresh fruits and whipped, sweetened vanilla-flavored cream. Make 8 servings.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are newly aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, (2) newly persons who are at least sixteen (16) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) newly blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and (4) newly children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; providing that the amount of such assistance shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Newly aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that the amount of such assistance shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(2) Newly individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not capable for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided, further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Newly Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(3) Newly blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such

assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate is provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(4) Newly children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to such persons assisted shall never exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the second Monday in November, 1963, at which election ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) newly aged, (2) newly individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) newly blind and (4) newly children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) newly aged, (2) newly individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) newly blind and (4) newly children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Gov. John Connally says Texas is making a lot of progress on civil rights without demonstrations and disturbances. He urged Texans to avoid the trouble which is plaguing other states.

Roy Evans, secretary of Texas State AFL-CIO, indicated mass demonstrations are needed in Lower Rio Grande Valley to improve working conditions of Mexican workers. Connally commented such statements are irresponsible and inflammatory.

Governor also rejected labor's appeal for a special session of the Legislature to abolish right-to-work law and enact state minimum wage, saying he saw "no need, emergency or desirability," for such a session.

Evans said labor's traditional role is to try to inflame people against injustice, and he intends to keep on trying to do that.

**QUICK CHANGE** — From one of the unpaid boss jobs to a \$16,500-a-year assistantship is the story of Dr. J. B. Copeland of San Antonio.

When the Legislature created the new job of deputy commissioner of the Health Department, Dr. Copeland resigned as chairman of the State Board of Health to accept the job of deputy commissioner. He had been Board Chairman for the past ten years.

Governor Connally named Dr. N. L. Barker of Paris to replace Dr. Copeland. He reappointed Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin and named Dr. John M. Smith of San Antonio and I. D. Flores of Floresville, a pharmacist, to the Board of Health.

## Recipies

A good meal deserves a good ending. Try this dessert.

**CHOCOLATE MARBLED CHEESECAKE**  
2 cups dry cottage cheese  
1 pkg. (8-ozs.) cream cheese  
3 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
¼ tsp. salt  
2 squares (2 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate (shaved)  
Cookie Crust  
Apricot Glaze

In a mixing bowl beat together cottage cheese and cream cheese until smooth. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Mix in sugar, vanilla and salt until well blended. Sprinkle about 1 tablespoon shaved chocolate over bottom of crust, then spoon in about 1 cup cheese filling, spreading evenly to sides.

Top with another tablespoon shaved chocolate, then 1 cup cheese filling; repeat layering until all filling is used. Reserve 1 tablespoon chocolate for garnish. Bake in a moderate (350 degrees) oven for 45 minutes. Cool.

Spread with Apricot Glaze, sprinkle with reserved chocolate and sifted

confectioners sugar, if desired. Chill before serving. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

**COOKIE CRUST**  
Cream ¼ cup butter and ¼ cup sugar thoroughly. Blend in 1 egg and ½ teaspoon vanilla; then add 1 cup flour and mix well. Press into bottom and sides of 11 by 7 by 1½-inch pan. Bake in hot (400 degrees) oven about 10 minutes, or until lightly browned. Cool.

**APRICOT GLAZE**  
In a small saucepan heat ½ cup apricot preserves and 1 tablespoon orange juice until melted. Cool slightly.

**NO-BAKE COOKIES**  
2 cups sugar  
½ cup milk  
½ cup shortening  
3 tbsps. cocoa  
½ tsp. salt

Mix above ingredients together and bring to a boil. Heat thoroughly, clear through and then remove from heat and add the following:

3 cups quick oatmeal  
1 cup nutmeats  
1 cup coconut  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Drop mixture by spoonfuls onto cookie sheet and let cool until firm.

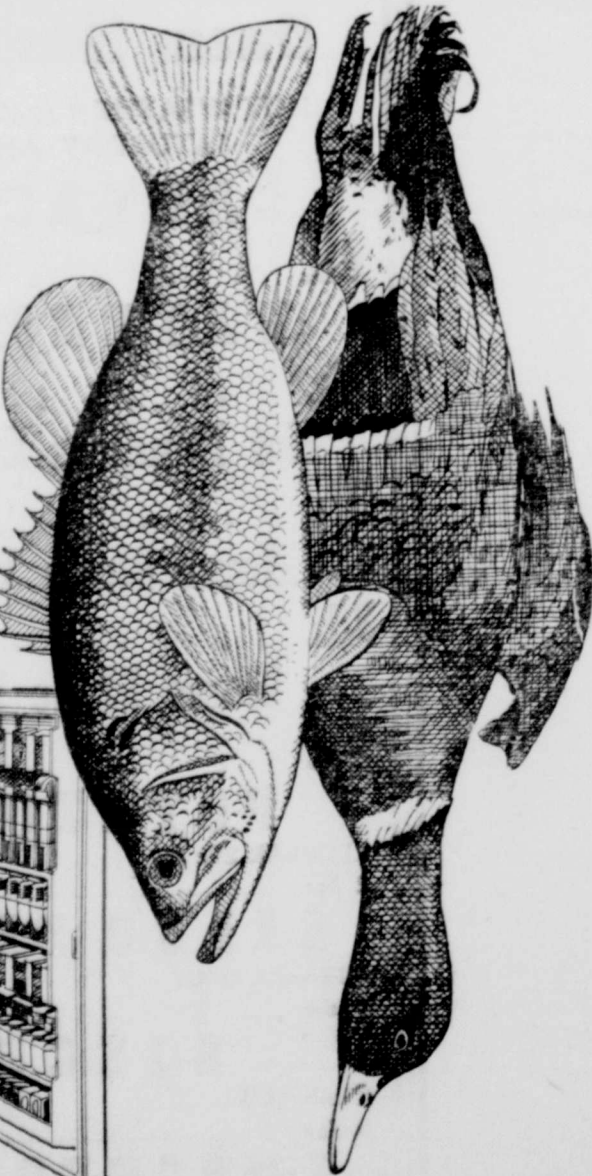

### 'MEMOIRS' OF A GIGANTIC FRAUD

## Sorrow, Hope, New Future Voiced By Estes Associate

Harold E. Orr, whose memoirs sell in 11 volumes for about \$6,000, is going to start a 10-year stretch in the federal penitentiary September 1 and is reasonably resigned to it, according to a story released by UPI with an Amarillo, Texas dateline earlier this week.

"It does not profit me to stay out," said Orr, a leading associate of bankrupt and convicted farm financier Billie Sol Estes. "I do not want another stay."

"Now I just want to get this behind me, get a nice little job and get bread and beans for my family. No more wild dreams about the future."

**Enjoyed Modest Success**

Orr's memoirs are mainly about his deals with Estes and are legally known as a deposition. More than 20 lawyers questioned him for four months. It takes 11 volumes, each two inches thick, to hold the transcribed questions and answers.

When a lawyer wants a copy of the deposition, it has to be reproduced, page by page, on a duplicating machine. Since the cost is about \$6,000 a copy, Orr's memoirs have enjoyed only a modest success.

Orr was president of Superior (tank) Manufacturing Co. of Amarillo which Estes used as a front to sell mortgages, signed by West Texas farmers, to 12 big finance companies.

Superior made few, if any, thanks for Estes, but with the help of Orr and two other Superior officials, Estes was able to sell about \$24 million worth of mortgages on anhydrous ammonia fertilizer tanks.

**Last Weeks Of Freedom**

Orr, 32, and the other Superior officials — Coleman D. McSpadden, director and leading stockholder, and Ruel Alexander, secretary-treasurer — were arrested April 29, 1962, about the same time Estes was.

Pleading guilty to fraud and conspiracy charges before U. S. Dist. Judge R. E. Thomason in El Paso on July 13, 1962, Orr and McSpadden were sentenced to 10 years each and Alexander to 6.

Estes chose to stand trial on the same charges. A jury found him guilty and Judge Thomason sentenced him to 15 years in the federal penitentiary. A state court has sentenced Estes to eight years for swindling a farmer and more than 30 counts of various indictments against him remain untried.

Orr, McSpadden and Alexander all have to report to federal prison in September. Orr is spending his last weeks of freedom cleaning house, mowing the yard and answering ques-

tions of lawyers preparing cases for or against Estes.

**"What Might Have Been"**

Orr lives in a \$18,000 home. His wife, Barbara, supports him and their daughter Diana, 12, by keeping books for a cement company. The home, the furniture in it and a 1962 automobile are all that Orr has left.

"I am living off my wife," Orr said in an interview. "That's not good."

Being unmasked as a fraud has not entirely disgraced Orr among his friends and associates. He was especially worried about how Diana would be treated.

"Only one kid made a crack to her," he said. "People have really been pretty nice. I have not lost my friends."

Orr likes to talk about what might have been.

"If the FBI had not come in all would have been paid off," he said. "Billie Sol figured on an eight-year payoff. This is the biggest mess I have ever seen in my life and it could have been avoided if they had let the creditors alone."

**The Greatest Salesman**

"I feel sorry for Billie Sol. I actually believe he never intended to defraud anyone. He just has a

split personality. One side is deeply religious and the other believes what had to be done had to be done.

"He is the greatest salesman that ever lived. He could have been a millionaire if he had gone the right way."

"When I got into this, I did not know we were going to float paper all over the world. Every deal was the last. You know we did over \$3.5 million in legitimate business beside the other."

Orr expects to get holidays from prison, perhaps for the first five years of his term, to testify in various Estes trial and legal hearings.

He already has testified against Estes before a state court. He was summoned as a witness in federal court in El Paso but did not testify. He has testified in the state trial of R. E. Clements, the original owner of Superior Manufacturing, and in the first of his civil trials involving bogus tank contracts.

Orr said he will testify anywhere, any time.

Estes said jump and I said how high," Orr said.

"We committed a sin and have to pay for it. The days are just clicking off."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED UPON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the payment of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board (Section 49b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, of \$150,000,000.00); providing for issuance of such bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that it shall read as follows:

"Section 49b. By virtue of prior Amendment to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in business affairs. One (1) of whom shall be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000.00) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for interest as is now or may hereafter be provided by law; and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; and shall be issued and sold in such installments as may be determined by said Board and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the rate or rates of interest shall not exceed six percent, as that phrase is commonly used and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment or any bonds may hereafter be issued and sold. One-half percent (1/2%) of all bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchaser, be deposited to the credit of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division containing the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single constitutional authorization) and the moneys attributable thereto, shall be deposited therewith, the moneys attributable to such Division, the moneys secured, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds purchased by such Division, the moneys secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1965; and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to said additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 31, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 31, 1965, all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1965; and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to said additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 31, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 31, 1965, all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.
