But, in recent years, we have failed to comprehend the thinking behind some of the monumental decisions handed down by the Supreme Court. Another such ruling was passed out this week in Washington. FRANK COSTELLO, gambler, racketeer, hoodlum, and frequently described as the "prime minister of the underworld," was favored by the highest court in the land in its decision. In a 6-2 decision the court climaxed a 14-year fight to denaturalize COS-TELLO and send him back to the cradle of his boyhood days in the old country. COSTELLO was born FRAN-CESCO CASTIGLIA in Italy. I'm personally proud that that great American patriot and justice TOM CLARK, Dallas, was one of the minority in this decision.
