The Launching Pad By NEAL ESTES

read an interesting story in THE DALLAS NEWS Sunday. In a two-column head a city proclaimed itself 'Dynamic Denton.' Denton is a good Texas town-population 32,000. A publisher nomed **RILEY CROSS** operates the newspaper. CROSS used to be on the Marshall paper. But CROSS didn't like the setup down there in the piney wood country - told the owners so-and bought the DENTON CHRONICLE, a mighty fine newspaper. Recently BILL RIVES, formerly with THE DALLAS NEWS, joined the staff of the Denton publication as executive editor. RIVES is one of Texas' top journalists. The purpose of the "Dynamic Denton business is to promote the facilities of the city." That's well and fine, but RILEY CROSS and BILL RIVES might have launched out a little too far in their description of the drive to attract attention to the "most unusual city of 32,000 in the nation." Not so many moons ago, Midland, our sister city, offered a glittering slogan: "Magnificent Midland." When industry failed to come into the area the municipal leaders changed the slogan to "The Tall City." Under that more down-toearth description, Midland will undoubtedly gain more industry in the future. And better still, Midland will develop the fine facilities it has-just as ART COLE pointed out to the Rotary Club over there the other day. And a very constructive editorial appeared in the MIDLAND **REPORTER-TELEGRAM** concerning COLE'S talk. It is good that Midland dropped the 'magnificent' and Denton might be sorry for the 'dynamic' because both cities could take a page from some aged Longview history about high sounding slogans. Thirty years ago a smooth talking, high binding chamber of commerce manager was brought into Longview. He is not remembered favorably there now, but he did author a slogan during his brief tenure. He tagged the town "Luscious Longview." Now in an area known for its blackeyed peas, corn on the cob, cornbread and turnip greens, that slogan wasn't even real. So the town leaders changed it. Today, Longview has more industries than any city its size in the entire United States. Longview is certainly a leading city, but there never was and never will be anything 'luscious' about it. The reason for Longview's great growth is easily defined. The city's well edited newspapers, the very efficient city manager, and the county officials stopped battling each other long ago and joined in a group effort to build the area.

STANTON WHITE drove by our house one day last week and we accompanied him to the scene a mile or so out of town to watch a giant tractorcat-plow operated by a very capable expert open the ground so cable could be buried. 


