The decision was handed down last week. Under the latest edict from the top court -the nine men up there now on the court - state judges and prosecutors will be barred from commenting to juries on a defendant's use of the fifth amendment which says even a Communist can remain silent.

"Comment on the refusal to testify is a remnant of the inquisitorial system of criminal justice which the Fifth Amendment outlaws," said Justice William O. Douglas for the majority. However, Justice Potter

Stewart spoke for the minority and said: "I think that the court in this case stretches the concept of compulson beyond all reasonable bounds, and that whatever compulsion may exist derives from the defendant's choice not to testify, not from any comment by court or counsel.'
