



"The result of these pretrial procedings provivded for last weekend with Mrs. Seain the federal rules for civil procedure was that all the cases were disposed of by just compromise and settlement at a great saving of time and expense for the litigants, witnesses, jurors, the court and the public," Judge Estes said.

In addition to the savings in time and money, Judge Estes said the pretrail proceedings also provide both sides in a suit a more equitable application of the law. "The law is far too complex and uncertain to be quickly and fairly applied in the heat of a trial," he said.

His first impression of San Angelo — a contrast to his home district in Dallas — has continued through his 10-year tenure.

When two new U. S. judgeships were formed in the district, it left each judge with his home district and one district away from home.

It was left up to Judge Estes, as chief justice of the parents for a visit. district, to assign the awayfrom - home districts to the five federal judges. He assigned himself San Angelo.

So the judge's second home is not only a change of scenery but a variation of his work.

When Judge Estes is not sitting in judgment on a case he is taking an active part in keeping procedures up to date and keeping members of the legal profession informed. He is a member of the committee on trial technique of the Judicial Conference of the United States, and after closing the term of court here he will participate in a seminar for new federal judges in Denver, Colo. the week of June 28.

During the seminar he will conduct a discussion on "conducting civil jury trials."

Recently appointed by the Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court to a committee on uniform rules of evidence, Judges Estes is one of five federal judges in the nation who have been asked to formulate the rules of evidence for federal courts.

Five judges, five lawyers and five author - professors form the committee undertaking the job.

The War On Crime

It just won't do to attribute the rapid rise in crime to "public apathy," and the President rightly has observed that it is time our public officials shouldered their rightful responsibilities.

The figures on crime tell a horrible story to the statistically minded, but little to the average person. To get a new view of how serious the situation it, let's use the figures in

Last year, enough people were violently attacked in the streets and in their homes to populate the entire city of Shreveport, La.

The number of people robbed equalled the entire adult population of a city the size of Bridgeport, Conn.

The number of women forcibly raped equalled the adult female pouplation of a ctiy like Fort Smith, Ark.

And if all the murders had occurred in one place, a town bigger than Gettysburg, Pa., would be completely depopulated.

Certain aspects of the crime problem may be alleviated by the federal actions the President proposes. He does not pretend that they will wipe out crime.

It will also be necessary for local communities to beef up their police forces, and equip them with modern weapons and knowledge. It will be necessary for judges and juries to sympathize more with the law abiding and worry less about the criminal's welfare.

It will require cooperation from citizens in looking after their personal safety, locking their doors and securing their automobiles and other property

Perhaps in time, someone will learn how to identify potential criminals and to turn them from crime in time. Meanwhile, the law-abiding must have protection.

Maintaining public order is the first responsibility of government. A government that can't do that is hardly trustworthy with any other task. Nor is it long for this world.

The Launching Pad

By NEAL ESTES

THE other day a guy named BERNSTEIN wrote book, "American Democracy In Theory and Action,." He and co-author mentioned that SEN. CARL HAYDEN of Arizona had died in 1962. 
