Hospital Transition Under Way - Texas' vast system for treating the mentally ill, mentally retarded and victims of tuberculosis is entering a vital transition period.

On September 1, realignment and reorientation of these facilities and services, as enacted by the 59th Legislature, will go into effect:

Separation of the tuberculosis hospital treatment program from the mental health and retardation services and consolidating it with the State Health Department, which now handles case finding and follow-up work.

Abolishing the existing hospital board - general policymaking agency for mental and tuberculosis hospitals and special schools for the retarded - and creating a new Department of Mental Health and retardation. A new, ninemember board will replace the present Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools. Sweeping new concepts of care, spelled out in recommendations of statewide study committees named by Governor Connally, are expected of the reorganization.

HREE band leaders who made reputations during the "Roarin' Twenties" have been heart attack victims in the last two months. Those who have passed on are: SPIKE JONES, RED NICHOLS and CLAUDE THORNHILL. The syncopated rhythms of these famed musicians set toes tapping across the country at the height of the big band era in the late '30s and early '40s. I used to travel to Shreveport when SPIKE JONES brought his group to the north Louisiana city for an appearance and many nights it was at the Muehlback Hotel in Kansas City that RED NICHOLS and his FIVE PENNIES sent their melodies bouncing off into space. RED was almost a fixture at the hotel and possibly played more dates there than anywhere else. Back in my salad days I used to travel lots of miles to hear the big bands. Another of our favorite band leaders was JIMMY JOY. JIM was born JAMES HARRY MALONEY in our home town, Commerce. JIM'S vocalist when he appeared at the BAKER HOTEL in Dallas for an engagement once was PATTI PAGE. And do you not-so-young people anymore remember JAN GARBER-idol of the airwaves; FRED WARING and his Pennsylvanians; and when GUY LOMBARDO used to set the radio waves on fire with his music from the EDGEWATER BEACH HOTEL "on the shores of beautiful Lake Michigan."


