(Continued from page 1) from perforations at 9,300-40 feet which had been treated with 20,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 1,153-1 and tubing pressure was 1,153 pounds. Originally it was potential between 9,300 and 9,985 feet for a daily production of 344 barrels of 49-gravity oil plus one per cent water. After a few weeks all shot holes below 9,340 feet were plugged off and the new completion from the top interval was filed with the Railroad Commission.
