

Afforneys Blamed For **High Rates**

An insurance association executive charged recently that excessive fees by claims attorneys have contributed to the rise in automobile insurance rates.

F. Darby Hammond said 20 cents of every dollar the public pays for personal injury insurance "finds its way into the pockets of claimant attorneys."

Hammond is executive director of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service

The State Board of Insurance recently raised auto insurance rates an average of 13.4 per cent. Last week, Dallas attorney Bert Bader filed suit against the board, challenging their action.

Hammond said lawyers net 25 to 50 per cent of awards in court cases under some contingent fee contracts. He said the Columbia Law Review estimated that the claimant usually got only about 48 per cent of an award.

Hammond said, "The public must be made to realize that high jury awards and excessive contingent fees charged by attorneys play a major role in the loss picture, and such awards and fees finally wind up with the automobile insurance buying public paying for them with higher automobile insurance rates."

Director Hoover Writes

(Editor's Note: The following article was written by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and passed along to law enforcement officials and to members of the press.)

"Paper Problems" are considered to be necessary by products of our complex, modern-day society. However, and nothwithstandin the apparent reasoning of some courts will frown upon my mission, stock producing areas all over Civil Aeronautics Board in and social workers, criminality in our Nation today does not fall into the "paper problem" category. On the contrary, it is a real and absolute menace, a serious danger' to the ideals and principles under which we live.

Law-abiding citizens have every right to be greatly concerned over the spiraling crime rate. Each day increases their chances of becoming victims of crime. Even if they escape the rising statistical columns of victims, they ore exposed to crime "fallout" in the form Aug. 9, then to Copenhagen, port for the program between er Southwest International og higher crime costs, inadequate police pro-Airport in Fort Worth. Consider also the plight of the law enforcement officer whose responsibility it is functions to the area offices to prevent crime and protect lives and proand two other Southwest Re- perty. His effectiveness is bein diluted by judicial gymnastics and turnstile justice which all but drop a legal curtain around hardened unreformed criminals. In addition, law enforcement in the United States is subjected to more criticism by outside theorists and pressure groups than any othe profession. I am continually amazed at the number of "enligh-t ened" groups and "freedom-loving" individuals who are so anxious to promote justice

by attacking law and order.

Experience shows that swift and impartial justice is one of the most effective deterrents to crime. Yet, swift justice, with all the technical loopholes and unwarranted delays in the law, is almost passe in several jurisdictions, and the rights of peaceful citizens are taking a terrefic beating from the "impartial justice" meted out in some courts.

Crime causations are many and varied. Few, however, are more serious than misguided leniencies, including abuses of parcle, probation, and suspended sentences. A young bank robber recently blamed such leniency for his turn to serious crime. The 20year-old youth pleaded guilty in Federal court to robbing three banks. He told the judge that if previous courts had been more severe with him on lesser violations instead of granting probation, parole, or suspended sentences, he would not have resorted to bank robbery.

Law enforcement, innocent victims, and society as a whole seek no special privilege from the courts or rehabilitation services. All that is asked is that the balance be kept true.

The answer to our critical crime conditions cannot be found in the shuffling of paepr. Neither can it be found in a theory that coddles and favors vicious criminals at the expense of the public. Rather, I submit that we need to devote more attention to protecting means of ferrting out crime and to securing convictions and adequate punishment of those responsible.
