

Another towering structure takes shape on the West Texas horizon near Colorado City as construction progresses on Texas Electric Service Company's 500,000 kilowatt generating unit at the company's Morgan Creek Power Plant. The boiler structure, shown at left in the photo above, is more than 150 feet tall, and when the unit is in full operation the boiler will consume about five million cubic feet of natural gas fuel an hour from the Permian Basin area. The new unit will be capable of producing almost three times as much electric power as the big unit located adjacent to it and completed in 1959. In mid-1966 when the new generator goes into operation the total net generating capability of the Morgan Creek plant, which is centrally located on the company's strong power system, will be 833,000 kilowatts. This will make it the largest of eight steam electric power plants in the Texas Electric system in North Certral and West Texas.
