The recent military base cutback announced by SEC McNAMARA has the 331st fighter interceptor squadron at Big Spring being inactivated by 1967. Of course, MR. McNAMARA'S idea about the close-ups and cutbacks it that he favors missiles over SAC. By 1967, McNAMARA just might not be around to handle the closing of WEBB. A lot of opposition should face him when Congress convenes again in January, but if the next session is as rubbery as the first one in 1965 there is little hope. Carlisle, noting that the State hatchery here is the soucre of the imported birds, asked hunters downing the protected birds by mistake to kindly report the band number of their local department staf-


