2	tablespoons lime	ripe avocados
	juice	3/4 cup salad
2	tablespoons grated	dressing

Soften gelatin in cold water; dissolve in hot water. Stir in lime juice and seasoning. Mix in avocado puree and salad dressing. Pour into oiled individual shamrock molds or six-cup mold. Chill until ready to serve (about three hours). Unmold onto serving plates and serve with chicken salad, tomato slices, wafers and crackers.




