





Most of the Texans with whom I visited told me about something that costs them more than it used to - or more than they think it ougt to - haircuts, bacon, clothing, shoes, taxes, insurance, television repairs, newspapers, college costs, medical services, interest . . . even eggs.

Now, some federal bureaucrats have characterized this development as only "crawling" inflation. By any name it is genuine inflation - and some people are talking apprehensively about runaway in-

The February cost-of-living icrease was the greatest in years. Today's dollar is orth only 75 cents compared to the 1950 dollar and only 44 cents compared to the 1940 lollar. It's the cheapest dollar n our nation's history.

Just a year ago the average American family of four told the Gallup Poll it needed a minimum of \$81 to make ends meet. This year it needs \$99, according to the same poll. That means the average family feels it needs this year more than \$900 in additional income to maintain last year's standard of living.
