

on the winnings. Q - I'm paying Social Security tax on cash tips I receive. Is my boss matching this as he does on my regular salary?

A - No. The law provides only for employee contributions to Social Security on tip income. Your employer is not the source of your tip income: for that reason he is not required to pay Social Security tax on tips.

Q - My wife and I are getting a divorce. What expenses will I be able to deduct next year?

A - Alimony payments may be reductible but legal fees to get a divorce and child support payments are considered personal expenses and are not deductible. If there are children and you provide more than half their support, you may be able to claim them as dependents.

Q -My return was audited and some of my expenses were disallowed. I have a report showing that I will owe additional tax. Is there anything I can do about this? I still think I'm right.

A - You may request a district conference to discuss the disallowed deductions. Procedures for requesting this conference are explained in the notice you received with the explanation of adjust-
