



## The Launching Pad

great Texan passed to his last reward in Austin, Texas last week. DAN MOODY, 72, a fouryear governor, was a prince among men and a politician and statesman without peer. Elected to serve his native state at the age of 33, GOV. MOODY was responsible for much of the finer things we enjoy today. He was the father of Texas' good highway system. MOODY was born in Taylor, Texas and at the age of only two financial reverses brought his family hardship. DAN got a job in a coffee roasting plant when just a lad. He drove a grocery delivery wagon. He served as an electrician and worked in a department store as cashier. MOODY got \$4,000 annually as governor as compared to the \$25,000 JOHN CONNALLY now makes. DAN MOODY retired after two terms as governor, declaring "I'm going to try and make some money to support my family practising law." He didn't continue in politics because he knew honest men couldn't make a living running for office all the time. A politician needs to do something in life except wear out the hall of our state and national houses. The more I see of this long tenure in office business the sicker I get of it. WITH most politics over and out of the way for 1966 we note the following: (1) GOV. CON-NALLY wants his salary increased from \$25,000 annually to \$40,000. (2) LT. GOV. SMITH says the next Legislature is going to have to find ways of raising more money to support programs sponsored by the state. (3) The monthly oil allowable has been reduced. How much more can the middle man stand in taxes? Oh yes, the House passed a bill raising the minimum hourly wage from \$1.25 to \$1.60 and the Senate is expected to concur. It's time some of those Senators and Congressmen came back to the cotton country and tried operating a business in a small town, a country printing plant for instance, and see how in the world you can do it without increasing costs of merchandise on the local level to a prohibitive price. This could be what the bigwigs in Washington want. Put the little people out of business so their dictatorial aims could go unchallenged. 
