CREAM (Makes 1/2 gal.) 1 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons flour 31/3 cups (2 large cans) undiluted Evaporated

1 cup water

1 tablespoon vanilla Combine sugar, salt and to Mr. Standefer. flour in top of double boiler. Add 1 CUP Evaporated Milk and water. Cook over hot water until mixture is hot and very slightly thickened, stirring occasionally. Beat eggs. Stir a small portion of the sugar-milk mixture into the eggs. Return to rest of mixture in double boiler and cook for 2-3 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and remaining 21/3 cups of Evaporated Milk. Chill thoroughly. 
