"If our thinking is correct it would appear that the state's largest fraternal gro-body. It . . . needs no super-up, with nearly 250,000 mem-vision except government en-combined total of such frozen acres for all the cotton proforcement of an official code. ducing states would reduce the acres available for planting n 1967 and future years below the 16 million acre legal mini mum set by Congress in 1958.

"Also, we would like to know what effect the acres 'regarded as planted to maintain the allotment and history acreage' will have on the State's projected yield. Dividing total State production by an acreage higher than that actually planted would tend to reduce the acreage per acre yield for the State, which in turn would depress projected yield. And under the present program projected yield is synonymous with dollars and cents to our producers.

"These are matters we feel need further clarification from the Department. And if our views prove correct, we would urge that the acres under discussion be made available to producers for planting, giving them the full benefit of the 6 acre legal minimum allotment and eliminating any detriment to projected yield computations."

One of the most frequently and fervently discussed subjects in Texas lately has been the Texas Water Plan and the future water requirements of Texas which prompted its con-

In this area, Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., has its Water Committee. Texas Tech has the West Texas Water Institute. There's a "2020" Water Committee with representatives from business, industry, agriculture and finance. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has its Water Resoucres Committee.

And all of these are seriously concerned with the future of the area as it relates to water for municipal, industrial and irrigation uses.

Over 97.2 per cent of the world's water is in the oceans r inland seas and is unfit for use without costly refinement. Another 2.1 per cent is frozen in glaciers and icecaps, leavng only 0.7 per cent in rivers, fresh water lakes and underground deposits.

That 0.7 per cent still might be sufficient to answer all fresh water demands if it were all above the earth's surface. But, say the experts, two of the most unchanging things about the world's supply of usable water are its unequal distribution and the fact that 97 per cent of it is underground.

The report does say that there is no indication of an over all shortage of water in the U.S. for the balance of this century. But there is danger of regional water shortages, particularly in the northeastern states.

The U. S. and the world has the same problem Texas has unequal distribution.

Anyone can suffer heat | Medicine. stroke if he is active in hot weather and neglects to replace salt and water lost by perspiration. The result is a breakdown in the sweating mechanism and collapse.

If prompt measures aren't taken to get the heat stroke victim cooled immediately, the result can be death -sometimes within 15 minutes.

Approximately 850,000 boys in 14,500 U.S. high schools now play football, said Clifford B. Fagan, executive secretary of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.





West Tex Mule Deer Show Gain

Pre-season deer population estimates west of the Pecos indicate a possible net gain of approximately 9,000 head over 1965, according to Tom Hailey, Trans-Pecos project leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Hailey emphasized that deer population figures released in August before complete census efforts are finished are preliminary estimates. However, the department observed Hailey's ten years of close association with Trans - Pecos deer herds gives considerable credence to his early projec-

Timely rainfall in many Trans-Pecos counties is credited with bringing about the increase in deer numbers normally total 200,000 head in the nine county Regulatory Area.

Population estimates by county are as follows: Brewster, 54,000; Culberson, 23,000; El Paso, 2,000; Jeff Davis, 25,-000; Hudspeth, 22,000; Pecos, 20,000; Presidio, 34,000; Ree-

ves, 6,000, and Terrell, 15,000. Brewster and Reeves Counties showed the highest precentage increase with an eight percent gain while the tricounty area of El Paso, Hudspeth and Culberson showed a 2/3 percent decrease in total

population.



The Launching Pad

By NEAL ESTES

YOUR correspondent was the first man to see and talk with SHERIFF DAN SAUNDERS Sunday morning after he defended his life in line of duty by shooting a Mexican male after an altercation in south Stanton. We had just returned from the hospital where PETE RODRIQUEZ, the wounded man, was receiving first aid treatment before being rushed to Midland for surgery. SHERIFF SAUNDERS was pulling up in the courthouse driveway with a second man who allegedly accompanied the slain RODRIQUEZ to Stanton and was said to be seated in a maroon car in front of the residence SHERIFF SAUNDERS entered in an effort to calm down a family dispute. After the prisoner, identified later as SANTOS LOPEZ, was locked in a security cell, DAN turned to me and asked if I had been to the hospital and I replied that I had been there. He asked: "How is he NEAL?" I told the sheriff it was my layman's opinion that the gunshot victim was not "going to make it." Deep sorrow etched his face as he said, "I'am sorry, awfully sorry. 

* When you have a driver tailgating you, slow down and encourage him to pass.

* Expect the driver ahead of you to brake without warning. Watch especially for situations which will cause him to slow down or stop.

* Stop smoothly and gradually when there is a vehicle behind you. Signal your intentions of stopping, slowing down, or turning.

* Look to the left, look to the right when approaching an intersection Never assume the other driver will yield the right - of- way, even if you have the green lights.

* When in doubt, never pass. Before you change lanes check your rearview mirror and glance to be sure your blind spot is clear. Use your turn signals when passing. Make certain someone behind you is not trying to pass at the same time. When passing, sound horn or flick your lights to let the driver ahead know. Accelerate and pass quickly. Get back quickly after you clearly see the car in your

Powdered rotenone can be purchased at most livestock supply stores since it is sold primarily as a grub control for cattle

Fish killed with rotenone are edible if cleaned when fresh, Klussmann points out. Rotenone is not a poison in the true sense since it kills fish by suffocation.

Rotenone loses its toxicity in seven to 14 days and then the pond is ready to be restocked.

People, cattle, sheep, dogs, cats, frogs and most other vertebrate animals are not affected when swimming in or drinking water treated with rotenone. However, continued inhalation can cause irritation and throat.


