Over 3 million of them lacked a high school diploma. Another 90,000 plus youngsters will be added to this number of dropouts this school year unless the nation mounts its force to prevent it from happening. To attempt to head off this possibility, LBJ has launched the 1966 Youth Opportunity Stay-In-School Campaign. Once, in America, a person could drop out of school and really find a job. ## DPS Issues Labor Day Bulletin

The Texas Safety Association today issued its annual "Accidental Death Alert" for the Labor Day holiday week-end and called on Texas drivers to personally identify themselves with traffic safety problems.

"Traffic safety is not a 'one-way street,'" S. Ross Carr, TSA president said. "Each driver is equally responsible for operating his automobile safely on our streets and highways."

The association president said too many drivers fail to take positive action in matters of traffic safety due to a lack of personal identification with the problem. "And, some even operate under the false idea they have some sort of built-in personal immunity to accidents," Carr added. "They think 'it' can't happen to them."

"This just isn't true. Each driver in our state has less than a 50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap, or without incurring injury to himself or one of his family."

Carr advised drivers to use extreme caution and display courtesy in traffic during the holiday weekend.

"Put all your driving skills to work; be prepared for the unexpected actions of other drivers; and adopt a proper driver-attitude to stay out of trouble," he said. "The TSA 'Accidental Death Alert' goes into effect at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, September 3 and ends at 11:59 p.m. Monday, September 5. The period coincides with the De-

## Texaco Inc. No. 1-B-2 A. Fasken Planned As Mississippi Explorer

Texaco Inc. No. 1-B-2 A. Fasken Unit is planned as a 10,900-foot upper Mississippian explorer in Northeast Midland County, 990 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 9, block 36, T-2-S, T&P survey, 6 1/2 miles south of Stanton.

Location is about 1 3/4 miles east of Spraberry production in the Germanian area, three miles east of the Azalea (Strawn and Devonian gas-distillate) field.

Pan American Petroleum Corp. continues testing No. 1-B Elma L. Slaughter, Martin County venture 13 miles north of Lenorah, a mile northwest of the same firm's No. 1 Slaughter, a recently completed Dean - Wolfcamp discovery.

The operation drilled to 10,500 feet and set 7-inch casing at that point. The section in the lower Wolfcamp at 10,125-138 feet was perforated and is now being checked naturally.

On the latest gauge reported, it flowed 72 barrels of oil in 12 hours through open tubing with surface pressure varying from 25 to 40 pounds.

It is anticipated that after the producing ability of that zone is determined, more of the possible pay will be perforated and tested.

Location is 1,320 feet from north and east lines of section 80, block B, Bauer & Cockrell survey.

Sunset International Petroleum Corp. of Midland will re-enter No. 1 Pearl and Joe Cole, nine miles southeast of Garden City in Glasscock County.

The project, the former Clear Creek, a 8,100-foot Wolfcamp opener for the Clyde Reynolds multipay field, will be cleaned out to 2,700 feet for recompletion attempts as a second Queen producer and a 3/4-mile northwest extension to that pay.

R. S. Anderson and Anglo Oil Co. (Hamilton Bros.) originally drilled the well to 9,763 feet and completed it in February, 1961 as a Clear Fork strike for 38 barrels of 30-gravity oil daily, pumping from perforation at 2,813-17 feet.

It was re-entered and potentiated from the Wolfcamp as a discovery in August 1964, by F. E. Shaheen Sr. for 22 barrels of 40-gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64-inch choke from perforations at 3,138-54 feet.

Location is 660 feet from south and east lines (originally staked 580 feet from south and 700 feet from east lines) of section 16, block 32, T-4-S, T&P survey.

Russell Maguire has completed No. 1 Reed in the Ackerly (Dean) pool of Martin, two miles west of Ackerly.

It flowed 194 barrels of 41-gravity oil daily through a 10-64-inch choke. Production was through perforations between 8,450 and 8,649 feet with gas-oil ratio gauged at 400-1. The pay section was fractured with 80,000 gallons

Three miles southwest of Ackerly in Martin, Texota Oil Co. potentiated No. 1 Albert. It was finished to flow 233 barrels of 39-gravity crude per day on a 16-64-inch choke. Yield came from perforations between 7,778 and 8,615 feet which were fractured with 60,000 gallons of fluid and 100,000 pounds of sand. Gas-oil ratio was 764-1 and surface pressure was 200 pounds.

## Electric Bells Signal Start Autumn Term

It's school time A Go-Go in Martin County and time to give up the Beatles for the Books.

Summer vacation is part history and Stanton, Flower Grove, and Grady guys and gals are answering the green lights of A-OK for the autumn scholastic term.

Most school systems will take time out Monday to allow for a final Labor Day holiday fling. But come Tuesday, September 6, the more than one thousand students will "get with it" in an effort to insure the generations of tomorrow the best in talent, brains, and strength of character this country needs so badly.

Grady Independent School District kicked classes off on August 29. Supt. L. R. Dunn had his faculty ready, all students registered and after Labor Day, the group will get down to nine months of scholastic activity. The next holiday for the Grady pupils is Monday, Sept. 5, will become effective November 24 through the 27th for Thanksgiving.

Flower Grove Independent School District also opened up for class business on August 29. Student registration was finished on August 26. The faculty and the students go back to work until Thanksgiving on Tuesday, Sept. 6. Stanton is the tardy member of the big-three opening because the schools open here in the county hub on Tuesday, Sept. 6, following observation of Labor Day. Music for the dance, which is chaperoned by parents of students, will be furnished by the Wipe-Outs, a local band.

## Social Security Takes Bigger Bite On Jan. 1

Federal taxes will increase on Jan. 1 by about a billion dollars even if the Johnson administration doesn't seek an income tax hike to help fight the war in Viet Nam or to stem inflation.

That's the approximate size of the bite increased Social Security taxes will take next year to pay for increases in retirement, disability and other health care program for the aged which went into effect last July 1.

Some 75 per cent of the increase will be applied to the medicare program.

One Of Five Changes  
This, however, is only one of five changes in the tax laws which go into effect on New Year's Day. The others won't change the amount of taxes to be paid but will spell out in greater detail how and when they should be paid.

The bite in Social Security taxes next year won't be as severe as the one last Jan. 1 when both the tax rate and the basic earnings on which it's collected went up.

Only the rate will rise next January—from 4.2 per cent to 4.4 per cent each for the worker and his employer on the first \$6,600 in earnings. This will raise the maximum tax on each by \$13.20.

Maximum Payment Up  
Social Security taxes for the self-employed also will rise from 6.15 per cent to 6.4 per cent—or a maximum of \$16.50 on the first \$6,600 in earn-

ings. Thus, the maximum payment will increase from this year's \$277.20 to \$290.40 in 1967 for each worker and his employer and from \$405.90 to \$422.40 for the self-employed.

Last year the maximum payment was \$174 each by the worker and his employer based on earnings of \$4,800 and a tax rate of 3.625 per cent. The law which established the medicare program also set up a separate trust fund to pay for it. Consequently the Treasury Department and the Social Security Administration show separate tax rates for the basic coverage and medicare.

To Rise To \$323.40  
This year, a person who pays the maximum tax of \$277.20 will pay \$23.10 of it for the medicare trust fund based on a medicare tax of 35 per cent.

Next year the medicare tax rate will increase to 5 per cent while the basic rate will rise from 3.85 to 3.9 per cent. Thus, \$33 of next year's maximum payment will go for medicare.

The maximum paid by both a worker and his employer will rise to \$323.40 in 1969-72; to \$356.40 in 1973-75; to \$359.70 in 1976-79; to \$366.30 in 1980-86, and to \$372.90 in 1987 and thereafter.

Other tax changes which go into effect Jan. 1 result from the Tax Adjustment Act passed (Continued on page 8)

As a matter-of-fact, there never has been a weekly newspaper worth a 14-pound country ham in exchange for a subscription. Right now, today, I'll trade a long term subscription for the same kind of country ham, the NANCES' brought in to my friend KELLY.

TUESDAY morning headlines out of Austin brought news of the dismissal of VERNON A. MCGEE, legislative budget director. In a story in THE DALLAS NEWS by DICK MOREHEAD, the dismissal was described as "a surprise action spearheaded by speaker BEN BARNES. Our former state senator, PRESTON SMITH, now lieutenant governor of Texas, opposed the dismissal. The vote to let the budget director go after years of decent, commendable, honest service was 5-3. I am proud of the fact that my old friend of long standing SENATOR A. M. AIKIN of Paris, Texas, joined PRESTON in voting against the MCGEE dismissal. ed by Congress early this year which provided the first graduated withholding in American history. New withholding schedules ranging from 14 to 30 per cent went into effect last May 1.

One change will permit some taxpayers — those with a substantial total of itemized deductions — to claim withholding allowances which will have the same effect as increasing the number of exemptions.

Taxpayers now claim a \$600 exemption for themselves and each of their dependents but can't claim any extra exemptions to reduce the amount of taxes withheld from their paychecks.

#### Other Changes Listed

This new provision will have the same effect as permitting this extra exemption and will give the taxpayers more take-home pay. But it will reduce the refund he would normally receive after filing his income

These other changes become effective on Jan. 1:

1. Self-employed persons must pay their Social Security taxes quarterly with their income tax payments.

2. Taxes withheld from wages plus the quarterly payments of estimated tax made by some taxpayers must total at least 80 per cent of their tax bill instead of the present 70 per cent.

3. Corporations will begin paying their taxes on a current basis in 1967 instead of in 1970 as directed by Congress in 1964.
