Statistics now show that 369 Texans have died in the Viet Nam War. Figures show 292 Mam War. Figures show 292 men from the Lone Star state 91st Birthday killed in action with another 77 dead from non-hostile causes.

Two large bronze plaques were hoisted into place on a slab of granite in Dallas telling in words of the assassination of President JOHN KEN-NEDY. The late Chief Executive was killed three years ago Tuesday. One plaque shows a relief map of the route the parade took through Dallas November 22, 1963, and indicates the spot where the motorcade came under fire.

A - The amount of money you make has no bearing on your eligibility for schooling. Q - I daw \$66 a month from

Social Security, but \$2 is deducted for Medicare. Do I report the full amount when I turn in my income to the VA? A - Yes. You report the full amount before any deductions.

Q - I am entitled to 36 months schooling under the New G. I. Bill. If I go to school half - time for 36 months, how many months of eligibility will be charged?

A - Eighteen months.



Fewer Interior Colors Make Room Look Larger

Sound silly? Well, before you jump to conclusions, why not sit down right now in the room under consideration and take this

simple test:

1. What color are the doors?
(Odds are they're natural.)

2. What color is the woodwort? (More likely that not, it's a different shade than the doorsprobably a light tint or white.)

3. Now, what about the walls—what color are they? (Doubtless a third color.)

4. And, finally, what color is the ceiling? (In most cases, a different shade than the walls—usually white.)

If your answers are all the same, you're already an exponent of the avant-garde "all one color" school of interior decorating. And color selection is the vital factor.

But if you have as many as four different shades for your answers, or three, or even two, you have two routes open—selection and standardization. Standardization is, as the meaning of the word implies reduc-tion, in this case fewer colors. One or possibly two, instead of three or four.

"Do-it-yourselfers" will welcome the latter suggestion, especially when they recall painting along the top of the wall, strug-gling not to get paint on the white ceiling, or vice versa. When you're doing both the same color, you just brush or cut away in the corners and along the joints. This saves lots of time and con-

siderable wear-and-tear on the nervous system. Most homemakers prefer waterwith good reason. It's so much easier to work with and clean up after. When it comes to woodwork and doors—two areas that they usually turn to a semi-gloss enamel. Most paint makers pro-vide the two in matching colors for those who prefer woodwork and walls alike.

Mr. Birren, who serves as a color consultant for a number of business firms—among them the Du Pont Company—goes on to say: "Thus with walls off-white and the turnishings vivid with hue, the modern home is more expansive than ever before and there is far more action and ex-

tion's 300,000th physician was graduated from medical school in June at the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine.

Jerry Dean Leu, 29, of Alva. Okla., plans to become a smalltown "family doctor." First, however, he will go on for four more years of internship and residency training in internal medicine

Dr. Leu's graduation marks a medical milestone-the first time 300,000 physicians have been available to serve Americans. The number of M.D.'s in the U.S. now is increasing faster than the general population. The ratio is better than one physician for every 680 people, compared to one for every 737 in 1960. By 1975, the AMA estimates, the ratio will be down to one physician for every 638 persons.

Even more physicians are needed to meet an insatiable demand for medical services, the American Medical Association says. The increase in demand for medical services has come about through a growing health consciousness or the part of the public, scientific advances in medicine, new government health programs and the pointed out.
