



Grants Totaling \$4,800 Offered By Texas PTA

Grants totaling \$4,800 wil be offered in 1967 by the Texas PTA in the association's continuing program to encourage summer study for career teachrs, Mrs. L. L. Ledger, state president, announced to-

Twelve recipients each will receive a grant of \$400 to study next summer in a college or university of the teacher's choice, Mrs. Ledger said. Recipients will agree to take a minimum of six semester hours, and study must be in a field to improve the applicant's teaching proficiency. Recipients also will agree either to teach in Texas the following year or to repay the amount of the grant.

In 1966 twelve \$300 summer grants were sought by more than 200 applicants The growth of the state PTA's endowment fund, principal source of funds for the program, has made possible an increase of \$100 per grant this year.

"It is our hope that the teachers, administrators, and school boards of Texas will take this as tangible evidence of PTA's desire to cooperate for the benefit of Texas students," Mrs Ledger said.

Any Texas teacher with at least three years' teaching experience in the state and who currently is teaching in a school with a local PTA unit in good standing with the Texas PTA is eligible for consideration. Previous grant recipients, as well as members of the immediate families of the PTA state Board of Managers, the State Office staff, and the Board of Trustees of the endowment fund are ineligible.

Teachers may obtain grant application blanks by writing prior to March 1 to Scholarship Committee, Texas PTA, P. O. Box 2164, Austin 78767. Completed applications must be received at the same address by March 31.

Each application may be accompanied by letters of recommendation from the teacher's immediate supervisors. but the cover letter must be from a school district official within the applicant's district.



The increase in staple length continues a trend set in 1964. Staple for the High Plains crop in 1963 averaged only 29.8 thirty-seconds of an inch, with 2.7 per cent one inch and longer. In 1964 these figures, respectively, were 30.1 thirty-seconds and 5.8 per cent.

Cotton scientists agree that the length of cotton fiber to be produced in any crop year is determined during the first 18 days of boll life, and it is for this reason that the early freeze and other adverse weather on the Plains had no significant adverse effect on staple as it did on other quality

"The staple improvement seen on the Plains this past year is far from being all that is needed in this area," said Donald Johnson, PCG executive vice president, "but it is a step in the right direction and indicates an increased awareness on the part of our producers of the urgent need for grow-

He went on to say that the higher average came largely from increased acreage of varieties with the potential of produsing a longer staple, and that there is ample evidence that acreage of such varieties will take an even bigger jump

Normally, these same varieties which turn out a longer staple also have greater tensile strength than the short staple varities. So on an average year an improvement in staple length would mean an increase in tensile strength as well.

Quality reports on each year's crops are compiled by G every two weeks during the harvest season, using the computer facilities at Texas Technological College. They are distributed without charge to members of the cotton trade, textile industry and others, providing a current, detailed account of the quality and fibers relationship of Plains cotton.

The Cotton Committee of the American Textile Manufacturers Institute will meet in Lubbock on February 27, 1967, and will participate the following afternoon in a High Plains Grower-Spinner Cotton Quality Forum to which all area cotton producers, ginners and other interested parties will be invited.

This announcement has been made by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the High Plains cotton producer organization which arranged for the Cotton Committee of ATMI to hold its 1967 meeting in Lubbock. The committee is headquartered in Charlotte, N. C., and is composed of about 25 cotton

mill executives from throughout the Southeast. Donald Johnson, PCG executive vice president, said this is a part of the overall effort being made to produce a product on the Plains whilch will more nearly coincide with mill needs, bring higher net returns to producers and expand markets for Plains cotton.

Johnson said the exact time and place of the forum will be announced soon, and urged cotton people in the area to set aside the afternoon of February 28 for the meeting.

'We will have a much better chance of meeting mill demands for cotton when all growers and ginners are fully aware of what textile mills look for in cotton from this area and what mills expect growers to do to meet their requirements," Johnson said, "and this will be an excellent opportunity to get answers to these questions."

Also on the forum program will be a slide presentation showing changes in mill requirements over the past several years and a general film on the textile industry starring TV comedian Wally Cox.
