Cited For Heroism

U. S. Air Force Lt. Col. Pat N. Howard, Stanton, is presented the Distinguished Flying Cross at Udron Royal Thai AFB, Thailand, by Admiral U. S. Grant Sharp, commander in chief, Pacific. Col. Howard was visted for heroism after commanding an airborne C-47 Skytrain battlefield command and control center that came under heavy enemy fire durin a combat operation. The colonel, who has 25 years service, is a veteran of two wars. Commissioned through the Aviation cadet program, he served in the European Theater of Operations during World War II. Col. Howard is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Howard, Stanton. He was graduated from Courtney High School and attended Texas Technological College in Lubbock.







When the regulations have been finally approved by the Secretary, they will have the force of law. Handlers required to make reports will be required to "maintain such books and records as are necessary to verify the reports." It is specified that these records shall be retained by the handler for at least two years beyond July 31 of the year in which they are applic-


