



Surf fishing along the Texas Gulf Coast is fun . . . especially in balmy weather.

But . . . sometimes even the hardiest surf fishermen want to cast beyond the surf without getting their feet wet. This time comes to all of us when the air and water temperature both are too cold for wading out.

In good surf casting all the work of whipping out the lure is done by the rod. Like the little motor that starts your car engine the fisherman merely puts the acting act into operation.

Before the advent of glass rods, true surf rods were frequently seen in use along the window Texas coast. Just about every rod was made from a calcutta pole and ranged in length from nine to 12 feet.

These calcutta rods had a lot of whip. Unfortunately, however, they had a bad tendency to take a set. And even the most beautifully wrapped calcutta was never a rod of true beauty in appearance.

Attractive glass rods simply knocked calcutta into oblivion.

Except for fly-fishing, most glass rods were five to seven feet in length. They were ideally suited for general bay, pier and boat fishing. But not for surf casting - where a combination of a whippy rod and length is the answer to a long cast.

Fortunately, rod makers again are catching up with the specialized needs of fishermen today. A number of reputable companies now make good surf rods—glass ones ranging from nine to 13 feet in length.

Man, when you hitch one of these rods to a heavy-duty spinning-reel, you can get casts out of this world. Or, like the old salt says: to also check the rod guides and tip-top. "It is unfortunate and certainly unwarranted that the task force report should have been so interpreted and distorted as to over - emphasize alleged police brutailty and corruption.

"The report specifically cautions against any effort to generalize upon the few instances-less than one-half of 1 per cent — where its staff members discovered excessive use of force by law enforcement officers.

"The danger of highlighting these infrequent acts of police misconduct is that it conveys an entirely false impression that such practices are common and widespread. This simply is not true.'

Hoover said he was "confident that those who worked on the report will agree" that it was not intended as an

over-all indictment of police. "Even one instance of dishonesty or use of excessive force by a police officer is one too many," he continued. "But approximately 420,000 persons are engaged in law enforcement position in the United States today, and to cast doubt upon the decency, sincerity and integrity of the entire profession, base upon the regrettable actions of a very few - actions which are definite exceptions and not the rule - would be grossly unjustified and unfair." In 1964, the first year of the program, base acreage to of Man." be treated was almost 300,000. Last fall, it was necessary to spray only a base area of about 185,000 acres, and it is hoped this can be reduced to an even smaller acreage in 1967.

"This fact, together with other economies effected in the program, will make it possible for Plains producers to meet their obligations without an increase in the 40 cents per bale contribution," Dean said, "and the committees agreed that this figure would not be changed this year."

The program is jointly financed by the State and cotton producers in the area, with matching Federal funds.

Guthion, newly approved for use in ultra low volume form, may be used this year in a pilot project. If it prove ssatisfactory for use in the entire program, an even more economical and effective program might be possible in 1968.

Low volume Malathion is the chemical used for the past three years. It will be used for the bulk of spraying in 1967 pending proof that Guthion would do a better job, Dean re-

"I have never been associated with anything so exciting, stimulating, or offering greater potential for the South Plains than the prospect of importing water to the area for agricultural and other uses," says J. D. Smith of Littlefield.

Smith is President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and a member of the organizing committee for Water, Inc., the formation of which is one of the first steps toward bringing water to West Texas from areas of surplus.

Engineers and others who have studied the situation have convinced me that import water for this area is not only possible, but practical," Smith said, and added "It has often been said that with plenty of water the Plains could be the garden spot of the world, and I now expect to see it become just that."

The organizational meeting of Water, Inc., will be held at the KoKo Palace in Lubbock at 2:00 p.m. May 24, and members of the organizing committee are urging that people from all walks of life be on hand.

A charter and by-laws for the organization have been drawn up and approved by the organizing committee and these will be submitted for membership approval May 24.

"Too many people are looking on imported water as a pipe-dream," according to Smith. "They just don't realize how close we are to the day when the Texas Water Development Board, the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U. S. Corps of Engineers may say 'the water is available, we can get it to you at a reasonable cost, and if you want to sign this contract to pay for it.' And if we are going to be ready when that day comes, we've got to start now."

The TWDB, Bureau of Reclamation and Corps of Engineers along with three prominent engineering firms, have conducted engineering and cost studies already that indicate the feasibility of transporting water up the hill to West Texas and Northeast Texas and areas outside the State. Other studies are now in progress to outline possible storage site in the area, a distribution system and other details.

These will be discussed at the May 24 meeting, as will the possible cost of the water once it arrives and the economic impact on the area.

Initial studies indicate the definite possibility of importing from three to five million acre-feet each year to the Plains within the next 10 years, followed by another 10 to 15 million acre-feet annually in about 20 years.

This compares with about 5 million acre-feet now being pumped annually for agricultural use from the Ogalalla formation which underlies the area.

Smith said "This is something which could mean tripling he irrigated acreage on the Plains, extending the life of our rrigation indefinitely, broadening the range of practical rops to be produced and other benefits. Just the announcement that a contract would be signed for imported water would cause an immediate jump in land values. So I feel PCG, as a producer organization, should do all in its power to move the project forward as fast as possible—which is just what
