Say Yes To Hospital Issue

What does the establishment of a Hospital District in Martin County mean to me?

Creation of a Hospital District will result in improvement of the service available for all residents of the

Who will run the Hospital?

The Hospital will be operated by a board of six directors to be appointed by the Commissioners Court.

What will be the advantage of a Court appointed board? The hospital will be responsible to the needs and wishes of the community.

Some say the Hospital District will save money. Is this so? We never get something for nothing. However, money raised by the Hospital Distritc will be offset by money saved by the Commissioners Court.

What will the tax money raised by the Hospital District be used for?

The Hospital District law requires that indigents not capable of paying for medical service be cared for by the hospital at no expense to the County.

Are there other savings for the county? Yes the law requires that the hospital take care of its own maintenance and replacement of equip-

ment at no expense to the county. Will this result in savings to the County?

Yes, the money spent now by the County for the care of indigents and the money spent for hospital maintenance and equipment may now be saved and diverted to other uses.

Will passage of the Hospital District result in better care? Yes, care of the poor and the medically indigent is often impaired because of scarsity of County funds. Under the Hospital District law, all poor and indigent must be taken care of at no expense to the

Will approval of the Hospital District as a political sub-division resutls in benefits?

Yes, as a political sub-division the Hospital will be eligible for Federal and State benefits which are impossible now.

Could the Board of the Hospital District waste tax money? It is not likely. The tax rate the Hospital Board can levy is definitely limited to 30 cents per one hundred valuation while the County now has no limit to the amount it can spend to support the Hospital.

Yes. It will still be the obligation of the community and the Commissioner's Court to give moral and financial support to the Hospital and care for our

Animal health officials and expressing grave concern over the rapidly rising number of screwworm cases being confirmed in the state.

Sixty-eight cases have been confirmed in the past 10 days, and the 66 the previous week upped the Texas tally for the year to 300 cases.

Last year at this time, 291 Texas cases had been confirmed. Cases continued to mushroom through the fall months of 1966, with more than 1,000 cases literally explodingi n the state by mid-December.
