

The voters in the city will vote in the basement of the First Methodist Church. Three councilmen are running for three places and Mayor S. W. Wheeler is seeking another









and usually the grains are fairly high (two pounds or more per head per clay.) The value of the straw or stubble in terms of plant nutrients and organic matter, is worth \$6.00 to \$8.00 per acre when turned back to the soil, reports Hodges. Cover crops provide protection for critical areas. such as waterways, terraces, diversions, and steep slopes, both for wind and water erosion control.

There are several miles of terraces that were drilled in small grain this year, for additional protection and conservation. They also provide protection for farmsteads as well. Small grain stubble also provides an excellent seedbed for late planted sorghums by improving the soil tilth and


The Launching Pad By NEAL ESTES



The crimes against private property rose by 16 per cent as a group. Auto theft, for instance, rose 17 per cent, and burglary and larceny \$50 and over in value rose 16 per cent each.

Mr. Hoover said crime increases were reported by all city groups, with the greatest change in volume noted in the large core cities of 250,000 and over in population up 17 per cent. Suburban areas showed an increase of 16 per cent, while rural areas had a 13 per cent increase.

The FBI director noted that serious assaults, where a gun was used as a weapon, rose 22 per cent. One out of every five assoults was committed with a gun.


The vicious street crime of armed robbery had a sharp increase of 30 per cent, and a firearm was used in 58 per cent of all robbery offenses.

The crime increases, said Mr. Hoover, were general throughout the United States. Northeastern and North Central States were up 18 per cent, while Western and Southern States reported an average increase of 15 per cent

The figures released by the FBI disclosed that in 1967, police arrests for all criminal acts except traffic offenses increased by 4 per cent- a significantly lower increase than was shown in crimes.

Arrests of adults, which declined slightly in 1966, rose by 3 per cent. Arrests of persons under 18 years of age increased by 8 per cent in 1967.

Laws are necessary to protect the lives, homes, and property of the people. But laws offer less and less protection when enforcement fails to keep up with rising crime.


