Mr. O. W. Culwell, County's Oldest Veteran Has Rare War Record

Mr. O. W. Culwell, 84, is thought to be Callahan County's oldest veteran of military service. In addition, he is one of those rare individuals who was in the thick of things during two World Wars.

He first enlisted in the Navy Dec. 20, 1907, and remained on active duty status throughout World War I and long thereafter. He eventually retired with a longevity pension, however, when America was drawn into World War II, he was among the first to rally to his country's colors and served 42 months more, being honorably discharged at the close of that conflict.

He has his papers and medals and is very happy to show them.

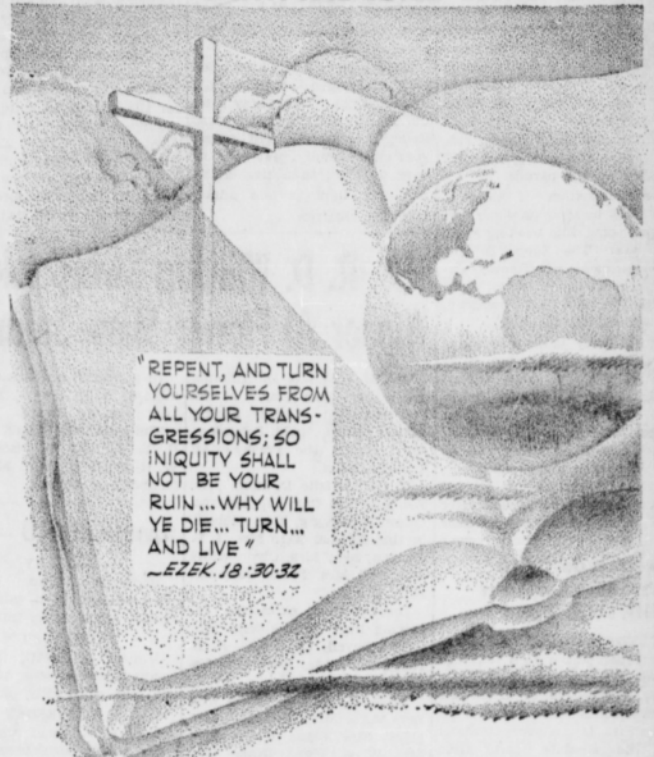

AFRICAN NATION VISITED BY LOCAL CITIZEN, Part Two

(This is a continuation of the story presented in last week's edition of the paper, written by Joe Wilson, minister of Baird Church of Christ.)

Only about half the children of school age are in school. Because of abject poverty and lack of school facilities to accommodate all of them, many do not have the opportunity to secure an education. The government is under way a crash educational program to try to educate more of her citizens. This program afforded us the finest opportunity for teaching the Bible in Ghana.

Each student studies "Bible Knowledge" as one of his regu-

lar school subjects. Ghana wants her people to be educated in God's wisdom, as well as in the arts and sciences. We were permitted to teach in the Teacher Training Colleges as much as five hours daily teaching Bible to the students.

We also preached nightly in the streets of the villages. The people would stand for hours on end to listen to preaching of the gospel. The preaching time was limited only by the endurance of the speaker. They are hungry for the Truth, discouraged over denominationalism, and anxious to study the Bible. Few of them have Bibles. Most of them understand English,

but many rather have the Bible in their native Twi or Ga. Often many gather around just a single copy of the Bible or New Testament to head it read. A New Testament can be had for about 20 cents in their money, but few can afford them.

In the larger cities one does find some of our modern conveniences, but not in the homes of the multitudes of poor. There are a few hotels and motels after the American plan, with carpets, hot and cold running water, baths and showers, modern kitchen and dining facilities, etc. Accra (the capital), and Kumasi (the second largest city) are two of the most modern. The wealthier class of people in these cities may live in facilities comparable to a modern, middle-class American home. They are usually built of solid concrete blocks, stuccoed outside and plastered inside. They will have running water and inside bath facilities.

Chicken and fish comprise about the only meat most Ghanaians ever have, and this only occasionally. They use them both in a hot curry eaten over rice (one of the main items of diet).

The farmer grows rice, maize, corn, a few vegetables, oranges, grapefruit and cocoa. Cocoa means are one of the main cash crops and the main export of Ghana. They supply 40% of the world's supply of Cocoa. The cocoa comes from a bean which grows in pods on trees 30 to 40 feet high on cocoa farms, which are abundant in the Ashanti and Brong Ahafo Regions.

A visit to Ghana is a most pleasant and rewarding experience. If one stays in the outlying districts for any length of time, he must suffer many privations and inconveniences, but he will be graciously received and courteously treated.

Ghana is rapidly emerging as one of the leaders of the African nations, and is worthy of the place.

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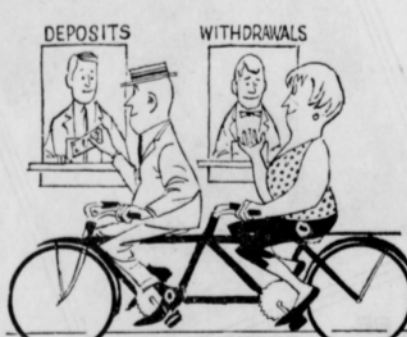

March Savings Bonds Totaled 11,690

BAIRD — In releasing The Department of the Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman Howard E. Farmer announced that sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Callahan county during March totaled \$11,690. During the first quarter of 1970 sales were \$23,503 for 18 per cent of goal achieved.

Texans purchased \$14,317,669 in Savings Bonds and Notes during March compared to the March 1969 sales of \$13,684,597 - a 4.6 per cent increase. January-March sales totaled \$46,858,407 - 26 per cent of the state's goal of \$179.9 million.

Sales across the nation during the month amounted to \$458 million - 20.3 per cent above March 1969 sales. Exchanges of Series E Bonds for Series H amounting to \$62 million were reported for the first quarter - a 26 per cent increase over the \$50 million exchanged during 1969.
