The Employees Retirement No. 1, the investment auth- System of Texas is already ority is broadened still further and the terminology relating to the Board of Regents is removed, thereby leaving no doubt that the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System has full juris-

ARGUMENTS

1. In the modern concept of employment, pensions are an absolutely indispensable complement of wages. As they are earned and contractual by nature, not free public employees have confidence in the perpetuity of the retirement system. By establishing the Employees Retirement System of Texas as a constitutional agency, as proposed by this amendment, public employees will have greater assurance that the administering agency will be a permanent

2. Adequate safeguards for funds available for investment are included in the proposed amendment. However, under its terms, it is still possible for the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System to For: returns in investment can be realized.

Parents should be concerned because many of the plants taxable depends on its type feet of water per second pass and vegetable gardens, and in ornamental landscaping, as well as in wild places. Leaves, bulbs, roots, seeds, stems, or berries may contain a poison, depending on the species of plant.

The beautiful oleander bush, for example, grown all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis. The toxin is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted on a

The popular Christmas flower poinsetta is full of an acid, so lethal that a child who consumes one leaf may die. Mistletoe berry can also be deadly. Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomato plants, close kin to the deadly night shades, have foilage that contain alkaloid poisons, which can cause severe digestive upsets and nervous disorders if eaten.

To cover the ground as quickly as possible and avoid seed losses, both in uncleaned heads and cracked seeds, maintain a compromise speed. When the combine "growls" it is an indication of excess speed and probable seed loss-

Losses in profits for the producer can be caused by grain left in the field, cracked seed, or dockage at the elevator.

In most fields, there is usually one spot which is weedier than the rest. The clean portion of the field should be combined first to get out the high quality seed. The weedy part can wait a longer period as it will usually result in higher moisture grain, O'Neal concludes.

The Launching Pad

The steel industry's two largest giants accepted terms of union demands, granted the biggest price increase in one package in less than 24 hours and price of steel to the consumer rose five per cent before a cat could lick a plate. The consumer, you know, happens to be the Ameircan taxpayer who must now pay more for the household articles, automobiles, and all things made of some steel. This is the "Great Society." This is LYNDON JOHNSON at his very best. He has; allowed the labor unions of this country to force it into inflation and it is well on the way to bankruptcy with no end in sight. I think a continuation of the JOHNSON policies, certainly by HUMPHREY or anybody else, would cause the country to pawn the flag to stay in business. If you happen to be one of those worrying about JOHN-SON'S place in history, pause and think of this statement. LBJ is history. He will never be forgotten. Like the depression of 1931 he will always be remembered as the man who broke the nation. The last President JOHN KENNEDY did more for the country when he made the labor unions and the steel companies roll back their prices in 1962 and by doing so saved the little men and women of this nation billions of dollars than LYNDON JOHNSON has done with all of his wild-eyed specialist legislation put together.

The cost of living, paced by higher mortgage interest and other home ownership charges, jumped one-half of one per cent in June to a level 4.2 per cent above that of a year ago, the government announced this week. The June rise equalled that of February, 1966 and was larger than any other since September of 1962. This price increase is another page from the book of JOHNSONISM.

COUNTY JUDGE BARBARA CULVER of Midland County says a decrease in spending and no raise in taxes is the menu for Midland in 1969. The tentative budget for the county was made earlier in July by the Midland County Commissioners after a series of budget hearings. It is refreshing to get this news of economy on the home front. Some of our best lessons in govenment are being assigned and studied on the local level. That is the specific basis for returning more rights to the states. The suction cups of the "Great Society" must be eliminated.

THE U. S. Congress has been accused of having precipated a "crisis of confidence" in U. S.-Latin American relations by making large cuts in foreign aid. A spokesman for the Organization of American States says the U.S. is going back on a commitment. What commitment? What politician in Washington made any such commitment. One reason we are in Vietnam today is because of some dumb past commitment. When did any one individual in this nation have the right or power to commit ten thousand boys to death on a foreign field of battle to further some pet political proposition? There is another commitment recently revealed. It seems some "bird"—(guess who) has made a commitment to toss the U.S.A. in on the side of Isreal in case of a prolonged war with the Arabs? Where was this promise made? Why? So, to our foreign brothers let us say: "the taxpayers made you no promises—go to work and make your own living and stop expecting handouts from Amer-

Radio stations in this area continue to hire cheap labor and they get what they pay for. The public gets a dose of dialogue so disastrous to the speaking of plain vanilla Americanese it hurts. Back in the day when radio was in its heydey, one of the claims made for it was that it would improve the diction of all Americans and, at the same time, do away with accents differing with the several sections of the country. It is too bad it did neither-especially the former. A canned commercial which has been running for sometime on radio is built around non-existent "bumpa stikas." It further is spiced with more Brooklynese, practically unintelligible to average listeners. This is just one example among many. However, it does point up the fact that radio hasn't, after all, improved our national speech and diction because, after all, it hasn't demanded better speech and diction from the people it employs. Some of the blame may rest on radio's often bad vounger brother, television. It too. continues to contribute to sloppy language and ways of voicing it. All of this may not be of major import and it can be said that the nation doubtless will survive these derelictions. But it must be terribly discouraging to those parents who strive to teach their young to speak their native language properly, only to have the effort nullified constantly by professionals who can't.

e festering cancer of the nation's ghettos and the collateral problems created by them cannot be solved unless there is an abrupt change in attitude by government toward small and independent business. Tax incentives for small businessmen instead of continuing tax increases is the answer, in part, to the problem. A lot of persons in the big cities could return to the crossroads towns of America, and find employment if the government would stop making some small firms help sort the mail, and allow them to employ school boys in business. What is happening to those success stories we used to read about some tycoon who started his business career in a print shop or delivered papers in his youth? My late parents, God rest their sainted souls, used to keep good soap and clean water ready on the big back porch at our home in Commerce when I came in from a newspaper route so I could get the ink from my hands before suppertime. The American habits of yesterdays must be returned to this country before it is destroyed by those who have consistently capitulated to Socialism. I hope to God this is the last year of the JOHNSON-HUMPHREY type of government in America. LYNDON JOHNSON has openly proclaimed the late FRANKLIN ROOSEVELT as his idol. FDR is remembered as the man who shot the cows

2. Included in Boston Fund's 1967 study of college and university endowment funds were 17 funds, each with assets in excess of \$100,-000,000. Only two of these funds had less than 50 percent of their money in corporate stocks. The range of corporate stock holdings was from 39 percent to 76 percent, and the average was 59.5 percent. This compares with 30.6 percent for the Permanent University Fund. Clearly, the current restrictions on the operation of the Permanent University Fund are not in keeping with investment policies widely accepted and practiced by the more successful college and university endowment funds. The elmination of the 50 perent restriction on the ownership of corporate securities is a necessary step to the modernization of the operation of the Permanent University Fund.

Fluctuations in the stock market affect the day-today value of the Permanent University Fund. The maintenance of present investment policies can reduce the impact of these fluctua-
