The new section would authorize Dallas County to issue bonds for constructing, maintaining, and operating macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes without having to include the amount of bonds issued under (a) and (b) of Article III, Section 52, Texas Constitution in determining the debt limit.



## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or con-signee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private car-rier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a pre-determined out-of-state destin-ation at point of origin. ## Veterans Administration

(Editor's note: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their government provides for them through the Veterans Adiministration. Bellow are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA offices.)

Q - I have been on active duty for 25 months. Am I eligible to attend school under the G. I. Bill?

A - Yes. You must have had two years of active duty service to qualify for training under the G. I. Bill.

Q - I have just completed four years of active military service. Am I eligible for flight training? I have had no previous flight training of any

A - In order to qualify for flight training, a veteran, regardless of how long he was in active military service, must have a private pilot's li-

cense or be eligible for one. Q - I am receiving military retirement pay for disability. I would be entitled to disability compensation from the Veterans Administration but don't want to waive my military retirement. However, I would like to pursue a program of education as a disabled veteran. Am I eligible for vocational rehabilitation training assistance from the


